
As you celebrate the life-giving Easter message this weekend, may you also find space and rest in the coming weeks, before coming along to an enjoyable evening at the theatre!

CURRICULUM MATTERS

S.T.E.M. -WHAT IS IT?

STEM stands for 'Science Technology Engineering and Maths' and is frequently being referred to in education and the media. STEM is an approach, a way of thinking, and a set of skills from these four areas that students develop in order to design, apply, test and review solutions to real life challenges. While middle and senior years of schooling focus on skills for innovative careers in design, technology, engineering, science and maths, STEM also has an important role in the Junior years. So what does STEM look like in the Junior School and how might it develop further in the future?

STEM Play:

This is an area the Junior School is currently developing and resourcing with an old ruin being built in The Creek play area by Year 10 and 11 "Doorways to Construction" students who are applying their design and technology skills to this project. Junior students will also have the opportunity to explore building and creating in this space with additional wood and carpentry tools. We are also investigating additional STEM play resources such as Lego Technics etc.

2. STEM Integrated Curriculum:

Examples of STEM in Reception include students accessing iPad apps such as SCRATCH for designing and presenting their designs and learning, as well as designing and building mini boats. In Year 6 this term, students have designed animal prototypes with adaptations to suit the environmental conditions of their invented country Tata Gem.

STEM is an innovative approach to problem solving that will continue to develop in the Junior School. Stay tuned for more STEM news on the Junior School.

ECOCLASSROOM

TRAPPING NIGHT

On 16 March some of the students who are in the Ranger Program at Tatachilla including Chloe, Phebe, Emily, Chloe, Ava, Angela, Brianna, Brieena, Amber and India, all gathered at the EcoClassroom for a trapping night. During this night we set up pressure plate traps containing fruit scraps for the Brush-tail Bettongs and Long-nose Potoroos. Once one is caught in the trap they are weighed, their tails measured in length and width, checking of gender and nourishment, and tested that they are micro-chipped. This information is put into a computer containing all the past information of that animal, the information is then stored for later trapping nights or if needed throughout the years.

These nights are crucial for the EcoClassroom so we can see how the animals are doing in this environment and if they are reproducing or not. Throughout the night we had a great success of 20 animals checked and their data recorded. In that 20 we had 5 new babies' that needed to be added to the system and micro-chipped. The lucky people who caught these beautiful babes also got to name them. We now have a Jessie, Jerry, Sesal, Maeya and Ryan added to our EcoClassroom fauna data base. Living in the EcoClassroom is good for these animals and they will live a long and healthy life of up to 7-12 years in this environment, not only is it good for them but also for us as we get to learn more about the different species of animals and how to care for them.

Brush-tailed bettongs are a critically endangered species and are locally extinct. It is a great privilege for Tatachilla to be able to help preserve and care for these wonderful marsupials.

The night was so brilliant, we got to learn about how to trap animals and handle them properly while having a blast down in the EcoClassroom. I would like to thank Ms Lawrence for giving us this opportunity and showing us how much fun we can have helping out animals.

MT COMPASS BAT NIGHT



The evening was run by the Goolwa to Wellington LAP, Natural Resource Management and National Landcare. Mr Chris Grant ran an informative talk about the bats in the area, their behaviour and feeding patterns.

Although we didn't catch any bats in the harp nets we did get up close to two species of bats. We also had a unique experience to locate bats using bat detectors and hear their echolocation.




