I offer a warm welcome back to Term 2 2022 and a special welcome to new members of our College community.

NAPLAN

This week students began their NAPLAN tests in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9. These commence at the beginning of the day on various mornings in Weeks 2 and 3, so please ensure students arrive at school on time.

NAPLAN is an annual assessment for all students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9. It tests the types of skills that are essential for every child to progress through school and life. The tests cover reading, writing, spelling, grammar and punctuation, and numeracy skills. NAPLAN is also a snapshot in time of your child's progress.

In 2017 I was moved to read the following NAPLAN letter written by Gold Coast Principal Scott Anderson to reassure his community. Key points from his letter included:

"Before you take this test, there is something significant for you to know; this test does not assess what makes each of you exceptional. The people who score these tests don't know that some of you love to sing, are good at drawing or can teach others how to use a computer program. They have not seen how some of you can dance with grace or speak confidently to a large group. They do not know that your friends count on you to be there for them when they are sad. They don't know that you participate in sports, help your Mum and Dad or that you play with your little brother, sister or cousins."

I remain inspired by this letter. I encourage all parents to join our staff in reassuring your child that NAPLAN should be a time of celebration and not stress.

SORRY DAY

On Thursday 26 May, the College will commemorate National Sorry Day. Classes will listen to the National Apology offered by the then Prime Minister Kevin Rudd. The apology asks Australia to reflect on past injustices and unite Australia as one country respectful of all. National Sorry Day is a day to acknowledge the strength of Stolen Generations Survivors and reflect on how Australians can all play a part in the healing process for the people and nation.

REST IN PEACE

During the term break, the College commemorated the life of former Board Member Mr Jack Pitcher. Jack was a valued member of our community who blessed the College with his wisdom, gentleness and humour. We offer his wife Christine and family every blessing.

AWESOME @ TATACHILLA LUTHERAN COLLEGE

Since 2009, The Awesome Foundation has integrated a sense of purpose and meaning in communities worldwide, providing an avenue for individuals and groups to fund their awesome initiatives and, consequently, help their community.

Every month, one chapter of ten trustees grants \$100 each, distributing the collective \$1,000 on a no-strings-attached basis to people and groups working on their awesome projects throughout their catchment area. The Awesome Foundation, founded in Boston by Tim Hwang, has since advanced the interest of awesome in 13 different countries, with 82 chapters of awesome. To date, the Awesome Foundation has granted \$5,755,000 to 5,755 local initiatives, inspiring the essence of awesome.

The Fleurieu's Awesome Chapter, run from The Meeting Place McLaren Vale, assembles once a month to decide who should assume the grant, funding projects such as 'The Green Pantry', which distributes hampers to those in need, to most recently, the Willunga District Heritage Art Exhibition, which aims to bring artists together from the region to paint heritage sites and buildings, providing visitors with informative and engaging narratives through artistic impressions.

YEAR 3 AND 5 NAPLAN TESTING IN WEEKS 2 AND 3

Part of our College's obligations under the Australian Education Act 2013 is for students in Years 3 and 5 to participate in the National Assessment Program - Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN). The scheduled test period started on Tuesday 10 May and runs until Friday 20 May. Junior School children have already completed their writing and reading assessments.

The results provide valuable data about the performance of individual students and will be reported to parents/caregivers. The College will also receive data that allows us to compare the performance of the year level against national standards and will help us to monitor the longitudinal attainment of students as they move through the College.

This assessment will take place in your child's home classroom and is online again this year. Students must bring their fully charged iPads and be at their classroom promptly at 8:40am so that they can be seated in time for the tests to start.

A FOCUS ON GEOLOGY IN SCIENCE

During Week 1, our Year 8 students and Science staff have been busy exploring Geology with the help of TESEP (Teachers Earth Science Education Program). Rob Kirk, geologist, and experienced educator in sedimentary basin stratigraphy, guided our staff in professional learning and on a local field trip. The Year 8s observed a variety of rocks, minerals, and fossils as Rob shared some geological stories with our students. Students enjoyed handling a range of items including a giant white pointer shark tooth from the Miocene called a Megalodon and a small, fossilised plesiosaurus dinosaur. They explored how the presence of iron was identified within the layers of rock using a magnet which was strongly attracted to the mineral within one of the rock samples.

Heightened levels of youth anxiety and depression are also closely linked with those that experience bullying behaviours. We do know that early intervention and open lines of communication with young people provide some protection however social media and other online platforms have provided an avenue for bullying to enter our children's bedrooms and impact all aspects of their lives.

Many parents feel teaching their kids about online safety is important, but they don't quite know how to go about it. With hundreds of sites promoting their own product it is often hard to sift through the sites to find appropriate and credible information that is written in an easily accessible way. That's why we would like to suggest a great resource that has been created to support parents and young people.

Dolly's Dream was created by Kate and Tick Everett following the shattering loss of their 14-year-old daughter, Dolly. Kate and Tick's goal is to prevent other families walking this road. They want to change the culture of bullying by addressing the impact of bullying, anxiety, depression and youth suicide, through education and direct support to young people and families. Dolly's Dream is proudly brought to you by the Alannah & Madeline Foundation.

SCREEN TIME

As a result of the global pandemic, there has been a noticeable shift in the amount of time people spend on screen-based devices. Families are transitioning back to pre-COVID routines but many are still struggling to re-establish the boundaries and rules around screen use. Some continue to deal with digital conflict and tech-tantrums on a daily basis. The latest research found that 77% of teenagers spend more than five hours on screens per day, but it is important to note that not all screen time is considered equal.

Parents play a crucial role in modelling a positive and healthy approach to using screens and assisting children to navigate the content they watch. It is better to model and mentor screen use, rather than monitor it. Children tend to do more of what they see us do, and less of what we tell them to do. However, it is still important to outline the risks and highlight the benefits of screen use to ensure you keep a balanced attitude. Encourage discussions around the issues that people experience in monitoring their screen time and be honest about your own difficulties.

Parents need to remain firm in their approach to managing screen time. Excessive screen time can be detrimental to a child's overall wellbeing. Ensuring the correct privacy settings are in place is vital to prevent children from being inadvertently exposed to inappropriate content or online predators. Parents need to also be mindful of the potential impact screen time can have on a child's social, emotional, educational, behavioural, and even physical domains.

In this edition of SchoolTV, caregivers will be provided with a range of guidelines and strategies to help manage screen time at home. We hope you take time to reflect on the information offered in this month's edition, and we always welcome your feedback.




