## TEACHING & LEARNING



### STEM - EQUIPPING OUR STUDENTS FOR INNOVATION AND CHANGE

STEM stands for 'Science Technology Engineering and Maths'. It is an approach, a way of thinking, and a set of skills drawn from these four areas that students develop in order to design, apply and test solutions to real life challenges. Recently, there have

been a multitude of examples of this in action across our College.

#### SCIENCE

Recently our Year 8 students and their Science teachers participated in a Science Workshop Incursion focusing on earth sciences, tectonic plates, rocks and fossils. This was facilitated by a palaeontologist geologist who has worked in industry and government, and another experienced educator whose area of expertise includes sedimentary basin stratigraphy (the study of rocks to determine the succession of time and events in history) as applied to exploration.

At the end of last year, all students from Years 3 to Year 10 completed Progressive Achievement Testing for Science. This will be an annual process that enables us to track our students' growth as scientists and assist us to tailor our Science teaching and learning to maximise student scientific understanding and application.

#### TECHNOLOGY

Year 6 students are commencing a digital technologies coding unit whereby they will explore the five fundamental computing concepts of computational thinking in the process of building an online game (decomposition, generalisation, abstraction, pattern recognition, algorithm design.)

Year 8 students have designed, tested, built and evaluated LED lamps to great effect, while Year 12 students in the Stage 2 subject Industry and Entrepreneurial Solutions, have investigated and analysed design features, processes, materials, and production techniques when applying creative thinking to their metal-based products. This has required critical problem-solving skills and technologies to address problems and challenges. They also had to analyse ethical, legal, economic, and sustainability issues and the practical implication of these issues on society and their designs.

Their products have ranged from custom tool boxes for a particular vehicle type, to a low-poly 3D game environment model that will serve as a location in a fantasy-themed PC game. Year 12s will be unpacking the conundrum of Artificial Intelligence and Ethics in their upcoming seminar day.

# TEACHING & LEARNING

## ENGINEERING

Developing understandings of engineering concepts begins as early as the Reception years where students have been investigating the effects of shape, size and surface on how objects move, experimenting with this through human movement, materials and toys. Our Year 9 students this week participated in a highly informative visit from the Flinders University solar powered car, and the team who designed and built it. Aspects of its aerodynamic design, compactness of its engine that can nevertheless reach over 130kph, and the solar power system were of particular interest. The same concepts of shape, size and surface were paramount in both the Reception and Year 9 engineering experiences, demonstrating the importance of spiral learning and revisiting key concepts.

## MATHS

Several of our Middle School Students have recently engaged in the Computational and Algorithmic Thinking (CAT) Maths Competition focussing on problem solving, designed to encourage student curiosity and promote multiple modes of thinking. Similarly, Team Tatachilla is a group of Year 5 and 6 students who compete in the year long, real world, problem-solving Olympiad Competition. These students are challenged and supported to develop their independence, resilience and flexibility as mathematicians and problem solvers.

If we are to genuinely equip our students to ethically and efficiently navigate the challenges that exponential change creates, then innovative application of STEM skills and understanding is crucial for designing solutions to real world problems. STEM is an important focus in the learning journey of students at Tatachilla Lutheran College.

## from the head of **JUNIOR YEARS**

In Junior School Chapel this week, Pastor Jon and Sarah Lush spoke about saying sorry to each other when things go wrong. Drawing on the well-known story of Joseph and his brothers, who despite everything they had done to him, were reconciled. Joseph was able to graciously forgive his brothers and rescue them and their families from the approaching drought.

Ms Lindee Hopkins, Junior School Wellbeing Leader, also spoke about how we work towards reconciliation using restorative practices.

In the Junior School, learning and play occurs in safe, secure environments where everyone is valued and treated with respect. Restorative chats and conferences are times to develop, maintain and repair relationships. Everyone takes responsibility for their behaviour by thinking through what happened and the consequences of making that choice. Teachers and children participate in a restorative chat or conference after an argument, rough play or if harm has occurred in the classroom or playground. Participation in restorative chats and conferences is voluntary.

The Junior School guide to restorative practices states:

*“When things go wrong at school with a friend, or we make a B choice in the playground or classroom, we find a way to fix it. Everyone is responsible for this and has a say in how we can put things right or to make things better. This is a choice we all make so that the Junior School is a safe place to learn and play.”*

These questions are typically used in restorative chats and conferences:

- What happened?
- What were you thinking of at the time?
- What have you thought about since?
- Who has been affected by what you have done? In what way?
- What do you think you need to do to make things right?

With the younger children, we might use:

- We need to talk about this.
- Was that an A choice or a B choice?
- How do you think they felt when that happened?
- At school that is not OK and next time I want you to...
- What do you think will make this better?
- What can I do to help you?

Restorative practices in schools are based on restorative justice principles instead of punishment. They aim first to build classroom communities that are supported by clear agreements, authentic communication, and specific tools to bring issues and conflicts forward in a helpful way so that classrooms are communities where everyone has a responsibility toward others and to maintain a safe learning environment.


