KISS AND DROP ZONE


Please ensure your child enters your car at the pick up area in the Kiss and Drop Zone. Do not ask them to get into the car before you have pulled in and parked. Thank you.

THE RECEPTION CENTRE CELEBRATING NATIONAL RECONCILIATION WEEK

During Week 5, the Reception students moved through stations each morning, investigating three provocations, each one relating to Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander culture. They decorated sticks with natural materials, used air-drying clay to sculpt an array of tools and read an assortment of texts, whilst engaging in symbol writing in red soil. To conclude each morning, students would share their thinking and their wonderings.

- How do they get food? **Emma**
- Why do they eat honey ants?
- Do Kaurna people make the tools or do they just get them? **Sierra**
- How do you use a boomerang? **Evelyn**
- Why do Aboriginal people write in the dirt? **Mackenzie**
- If Aboriginal people all speak different languages, how do they know what each other are saying?
- How do Aboriginal people track without devices? **Casey**
- When do Aboriginal people tell stories? **Yanish**
- If Aboriginal didn't know the track, how did they know what food they were getting? **Jasmine**
- What do Aboriginal people use to make houses? **Jack**
- I wonder what sort of houses Aboriginal people have **Noah**



On Friday, the Receptions then rotated through new stations; stations that provided them answers to their thinking or allowed them to find ways to discover answers to their wonderings.

The Receptions moved through the week with empathy and developed their own understanding of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander culture through tangible and enriching learning experience.

When the week concluded, each child took home with them hand-crafted story-telling sticks, wodleys (Kaurna word for 'shelter') that they have built themselves from natural materials and clay, and the tools that they had created; each one of them being able to articulate the purpose of the tools they'd created.

WHAT DOES NATIONAL RECONCILIATION WEEK MEAN TO YOU AND WHY IS IT IMPORTANT?

- It is important to show our respect to the Kaurna People because we are on their land.
- National Reconciliation Week means we say sorry because we made a B choice; we took away their children and their land.
- I think it is important to pay respect so that we keep learning and don't make that B choice again.
- In National Reconciliation Week, we were saying sorry, but we also learnt about their culture; I liked building a wodley and I got to share it with my family.
- I liked that all of us came together and said sorry because it made me feel happy.
- I liked making the spears and the baskets because it was fun, and I hadn't made them before. I also liked watching the video about the Aboriginal lady in nature because I learnt we can eat lots of different types of ants.

Its origins can be traced back to the Aboriginal rights movement, when on Australia Day 1938, protestors marched through the streets of Sydney to highlight the status and treatment of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Australians. Today, it is a week-long celebration held in July that consists of range of traditional and contemporary activities.

NAIDOC Week is an important event that helps build positive relationships between Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal people. It enables a deeper understanding of our differences and similarities. NAIDOC Week is an opportunity for all Australians to eliminate bias and discrimination by reflecting and reconciling the wrongs of the past to facilitate hope and build a fairer future. Families are encouraged to join in and support young people in learning the significance of NAIDOC Week.



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
