NATIONAL TREE DAYS 2018

During Week 8 of Term 2, the Junior School participated in the National Tree Planting Day for Schools, an initiative the College has been involved in for the past 18 years.

The students did a brilliant job and had a fantastic time planting with their buddies, with the older students showing great leadership skills while guiding their younger buddies through the process.

Each student planted at least one seedling and by the end of the two days, 600 trees, shrubs and rushes had been planted in the 'Swamp', the open grassed area between the EcoClassroom and the Retention Pond. This naturally damp area allows runoff from the EcoClassroom Wetlands to be collected in the Retention Pond. Swamps are an important but threatened ecosystem and all of our seedlings were grown from seeds collected from a local swamp. The future addition of a board walk through the swamp means that while this area will be enjoyed by a wide variety of native animals such as birds and frogs it will also become a valuable addition to the schools environmental education program.

SMOOTH START

Ball games, other than handball, will not be permitted before school. This area will not be open after school.

We hope this will alleviate some of the congestion in the Years 1-3 covered area before school.



CLARRIE AND THE NUDE FOOD LUNCH

Clarrie the Caring Koala, who keeps an eye on the Junior School to see which students and classes are demonstrating the Tatachilla Cares values, is inviting students to join him for lunch on Thursdays.

While Clarrie enjoys a diet of eucalyptus leaves that come without any packaging or wrappers, he is concerned about the number of food wrappers left behind after Junior School students have eaten recess and lunch. Clarrie would like to invite Junior School students to join him for a nude food lunch each Thursday this term. Clarrie and the students will gather on the veranda behind the Years 1 and 2 classrooms.

Nude Food means there are no plastic wraps or commercial packages around the food. Instead food is placed in re-usable items such as plastic containers or zip-lock bags.



SUNSMART HAT POLICY

Tatachilla Lutheran College is a SunSmart school, and to be recognised as a SunSmart school, hats must be worn from the beginning of Term 3 by students and staff. When the UV level is 3 or above, sun protection is recommended. Data of UV levels for the past two years shows that there are only a few days where the UV level is less than 3 in Term 3, and these occurred in the first weeks of term. Wearing a hat every day from the beginning of term, regardless of the UV level, helps children get into the habit of putting it on at each break. DARTA has also been asked to present to a wide variety of community groups and organisations at conferences, seminars and workshops both nationally and internationally.

Paul Dillon is the Director and founder of DARTA and he is passionate about ensuring that the community has access to accurate and up-to-date alcohol and other drug information.

MONITORING OF STUDENT DEVICES

Access to devices in class enables both students and teachers to collaborate and learn in an online environment. Ultimately, the College believes that the use of technology enhances and supports the College's approach to high quality learning and teaching. However, not all students are using their devices in a manner that is aligned with the expectations and values of the College.

Over the time that we have had a 1:1 environment at the College parents have inquired about how we monitor the use of iPads or the laptops during lesson times. We have always done this both informally by viewing screen in class and shared areas such as the library as well as performing spot checks.

However, we are now rolling out a trial period where we are using specialised software to remotely view students' screens while they are in the classroom or on the campus and connected to the College network.



The purpose of the monitoring software is to assist in the education of students by, ensuring that they are using their time in class productively and are engaged in learning activities which are provided to them.

Please note that student devices are only monitored while on the College campus.

We are SunSmart - a note for families

Too much UV can cause sunburn, skin and eye damage and skin cancer. Overexposure to UV during childhood and adolescence is a major factor for future skin cancer risk.

You can't see or feel the sun's UV so don't be fooled. Whatever the weather, if the UV levels are three or more, it's important to *Slip, Slop, Slap, Seek* and *Slide*!

Our school aims to protect children and staff from too much UV to help minimise future skin cancer risk. We are a registered member of the Cancer Council Victoria's SunSmart Program. Please help support our SunSmart membership by ensuring your child follows the SunSmart measures included in our policy.

During the daily local sun protection times (issued whenever UV levels are three and **above**), use these 5 SunSmart steps – even if it's cool and cloudy.

- Slip on a shirt for free dress days, ensure your child wears clothing that covers as much skin as possible (e.g. elbow length tops with a higher neckline or collar and longer style shorts or skirts). Densely woven fabrics are best.
- Slop on SPF 30 (or higher) broadspectrum, water-resistant sunscreen – apply a generous amount of sunscreen at the start of the day and make sure children have sunscreen in their bag ready to be reapplied throughout the day. Sunscreen should be reapplied every two hours. Please ensure they get plenty of sunscreen application practice at home so they'll be all set when they are at school.

- Slap on a hat one that protects the face, neck and ears such as a broad brimmed, legionnaire or bucket style hat. Peak caps do not offer enough protection and are not recommended by SunSmart. Please help your child remember to bring and wear their approved hat.
- 4. **Seek shade** choose shady spots for play whenever possible.
- 5. *Slide on some sunglasses* if practical and approved by the school. Make sure they are labelled AS 1067 and cover as much of the eye area as possible.

Sun protection times

Don't just wait for hot and sunny days to use sun protection. Check the sun protection times each day so your family can be protected when they need to be.

Daily local sun protection times and weather details are available from the SunSmart widget on our school website, in the weather section of the newspaper, on the SunSmart website at <u>sunsmart.com.au</u> and as a free SunSmart app. Sun protection times can also be found at the <u>Bureau of Meteorology</u> <u>website</u> and live UV levels are available from <u>ARPANSA</u>.
