# from the **JUNIOR YEARS**

## **YEAR 6 CLIMATE CHANGE EXHIBITION**

This semester, the Year 6 cohort have collaborated with Green Adelaide on a climate change project. Whilst developing their knowledge, understanding and awareness of the impact climate change is having on our world, students identified the issues caused by climate change within our local and school communities.

In groups, students designed and created unique solutions to these problems, focusing on issues such as heatwaves, bushfires, flooding, storms, and biodiversity. In Week 5, a group of Year 6 students represented Tatachilla at the Green Adelaide Climate Change Expo, where they presented their prototypes to other students and teachers from schools around South Australia, and special guests from councils and local governments. The rest of the Year 6 cohort had the opportunity to share their ideas and prototypes with the school community last week, at the Year 6 Climate Change Exhibition.

## **YEAR 11 OUTDOOR EDUCATION ROCK CLIMBING**

*"Come forth into the light of things and let nature be your teacher"* - William Wordsworth

And so we did. The Year 11 Outdoor Education students were fortunate enough to experience three half-day sessions of rock climbing and abseiling, between Weeks 2 and 4, with two sessions at the stunning Onkaparinga Gorge and one at the adventure hub at Blewitt Springs. Students had two main objectives when completing these activities linked to their final assessments; human impact on the Onkaparinga River National Park, and the reflective practice of personal social skills in a natural environment.

Students prepared with information sessions from Vikki Hutchen from the EcoClassroom, enabling students to increase their awareness of the variety of human impacts and pressures that occur in our national parks, the impact on ecosystems and food chains/ webs, along with integrating these aspects to the rock climbing site. Students were fortunate to have the president of Friends of Onkaparinga Park, Graham Thomas, talk to them about the action they take to enhance the sustainability and natural environment of the area. His wealth of expertise has been invaluable to their understanding of their task of showing a range of measures to eradicate invasive species and promote a sustainable native ecosystem.

Each experience in Outdoor Education requires an element of teamwork and the ability to act together to achieve a common goal or problem solve. This was most evident during our rock climbing sessions, as each climber requires a team of three others to support them on the ground as the belayer, 2nd belayer and the anchor. Communication is essential for the team's success and safety during the activity. The ability of students to connect with each other was evident from their perseverance in overcoming challenges. The class worked effectively to gain a deeper appreciation and understanding of the environment and build their outdoor skills.

## **RANGERS IN THE POND**

Throughout the year in the EcoClassroom Sanctuary, the Middle School EcoRangers complete a variety of activities including flora and fauna monitoring, animal feeding, general park tidying up and much more. This week the EcoRangers put their gum boots and waders on and worked in the permanent pond area controlling the Azolla.

Using a variety of selected tools and equipment the Rangers were able to keep the Azolla under control. The Azolla is a native floating water fern with many positive water quality features, but can be quite prolific so it's important to keep it maintained and under control.

## SPECIAL REPORT: BULLYING

Bullying is an ongoing or repeated misuse of power in relationships, with the intention to cause deliberate psychological harm. Bullying behaviours can be verbal, physical or social. It can happen in person or online, via various digital platforms and devices and it can be obvious or hidden. Bullying in any form or for any reason can have immediate, medium and long-term effects on those involved, including bystanders.

Despite the efforts made to reduce bullying behaviours, the research tells us that one in four students still report being bullied every few weeks. However, not all negative behaviour should be considered bullying. The key difference is that bullying does not stop on its own. It's important young people learn how to identify behaviours that are rude, behaviours that are mean, and behaviours that are related to bullying.

Often the reasons for bullying can be complex. Some young people do it to get approval from others, some do it to regain control, whilst others may do it because it makes them feel safe.

Supporting young people as they work through their emotions will help them unpack the motivation and reason behind the behaviour.

In this edition of SchoolTV, caregivers can better understand why some young people engage in bullying behaviours and what to do to support a child experiencing it.

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## from the COUNSELLING TEAM

### DISORDERED EATING

There has been quite a bit of information in the media recently about disordered eating.

Disordered eating is the term used to describe an unhealthy eating pattern that can include restrictive dieting, compulsive eating or skipping meals.

Disordered eating can include behaviours which reflect many but not all of the symptoms of feeding and eating disorders such as Anorexia Nervosa, Bulimia Nervosa, Binge Eating Disorder, Other Specified Feeding and Eating Disorders (OSFED) or Avoidant/Restrictive Food Intake Disorder (ARFID).

Unfortunately, research suggests that disordered eating behaviours can be quite prevalent amongst young people and that since the pandemic, disordered eating amongst adolescents is on the rise. Eating disorders are severe and life-threatening mental illnesses. An eating disorder is not a lifestyle choice, and if parents are concerned about their young people being affected by this illness, they should contact their GP, paediatrician, or psychologist. A diagnosis can only be made by a medical professional.

Disordered eating can have a destructive impact upon a person's life and has been linked to a reduced ability to cope with stressful situations. There is also increased incidence of suicidal thoughts and behaviours in adolescents with disordered eating.

Examples of disordered eating include:

- Fasting or chronic restrained eating
- Skipping meals
- Binge eating
- Self induced vomiting
- Restrictive dieting
- Unbalanced eating (e.g. restricting a major food group such as 'fatty' foods or carbohydrates)
- Laxative, diuretic, enema misuse
- Steroid and creatine use – supplements designed to enhance athletic performance and alter physical appearance
- Using diet pills


