## CURRICULUM MATTERS

### SEEK FRESH HORIZONS - TEACHING AND LEARNING: 'IS PERSONALISED, INNOVATIVE AND CHALLENGING.'


This week's article, the third in the trilogy on Seek Fresh Horizons: Teaching and Learning, relates to how we make learning challenging for our students.

In educational terms, this requires us to know our students well in order to challenge each at his or her next stage of learning and equipping them with the strategies, skills and resilience to succeed. This entails providing students with rich, real life challenges to wrestle with and explore a range of possible ways to solve them.

Often collaborating with peers is helpful for finding ways to trial and apply deep learning. During this time, students may feel like they are 'sitting in the bottom of a pit' (known as The Learning Pit), feeling disconcerted or frustrated as they try, fail, try, fail, try again and eventually succeed.

Our intentional focus on developing and using growth-mindsets in this process is crucial for building up student resilience with problem solving, culminating in a real sense of achievement with their successes.

Concepts and language such as "I can't do it yet", "I love challenges and the excitement when I solve them" and "I



learn from my mistakes" are often the hallmarks of students who are genuinely engaged in learning that is challenging.

Some of the responses we as teachers and parents can provide our students when they come up to us and say, "I can't do it" – is to simply add "...yet" to the end of their sentence, or ask them "can you try another way?"

## **YEAR 11 TOURISM EXCURSION: CLELAND AND HAHNDORF**

On Thursday 2 August, the Stage 1 Tourism class visited Cleland Wildlife Park and Hahndorf in order to create a marketing campaign for the region.

At Cleland, students listened to a lecture by an Education Officer who spoke about the history of Cleland, the economic benefits of tourism, the environmental impacts, and how they market Cleland to different groups of people.

A student reflected, "The information at Cleland was really detailed. I loved their future plans."

Following this talk, the presenter brought out an Olive Python for students to pat. Some students were a little bit scared but several thought this was the best part of the day. One student commented: "It was cool that they gave us an animal experience. I loved the snake." Students filmed the kangaroos, koalas and other animals and will now edit their footage to create a series of advertisements.

One boy reflected, "I liked the freedom and ability to be independent with the filming."

At lunch we went to Hahndorf where students sampled the local produce such as sausages, cheese, ice cream and fudge and then they filmed local attractions. One student stated, "It was a great experience, I really enjoyed the food and culture especially the fudge."

Before we headed home, we went to the Beerenberg Jam Factory where students learnt about how they market produce and consider factors such as labelling. A class member commented, "I enjoyed listening to the speakers at Cleland and Beerenberg about marketing."

This is the first year that Tatachilla has offered Tourism and students have embraced the opportunity to learn about all aspects of the tourism industry. Being in the heart of a tourist region, this subject is sure to grow in the future.
