from the PRINCIPAL

It has been an extraordinary term of achievement, celebration and new opportunity.

We hosted our biggest Twilight Food Affair in College history on 24 March and welcomed more than 5,000 people to our campus to enjoy a stand-out evening of family fun before the close of Daylight Saving. This year's Food Affair was particularly special because it was the first major opportunity our College community has

had to reconnect on a large scale since COVID, while reinforcing the important role of togetherness in the lives of our children.

We have also been delighted to see thirteen of our teachers recognised in News Corp's Australia's Best Teachers series this term, which has shone a light on Tatachilla's contemporary curriculum and commitment to educational excellence.

GLOWING AND GROWING WITH THE TWO-RIFFICS

At the beginning of every new year, classes at Tatachilla dedicate time to build community and set a strong foundation for learning and wellbeing for the year. YEAR 3 SCIENCE

In Science the Year 3s have been researching, learning and making observations about living, once living and non-living things. from the director of **TEACHING AND LEARNING**

There are many benefits to being an R-12 College, including the privilege of nurturing students' educational journeys across thirteen years. Learning growth is supported by sequential, developmental College expectations that are supported by whole College documented procedures. To that end, we are reviewing and coordinating

our 'Academic Honesty, and Submissions and Deadlines Procedures'. A summary of key points from both will be emailed to families in the next few weeks for implementation in full at the commencement of Term 2.

ACADEMIC HONESTY IN AN ARTIFICIAL INTELLIGENCE ERA

Artificial Intelligence (AI) is already embedded in everyday life. From Siri to smart phone facial recognition, online bank account security to smart home devices, and of course social media platforms. Tom Barret, a leading Australian Technology Educator, highlights the speed and educational opportunities of AI, noting that 'The recent announcements made by major players in the industry underscore the importance of preparing students and schools to be AI-ready...With the proliferation of generative AI tools and a powerful suite of creative tools, students now have more options than ever to express themselves... These developments are changing the workspace environment and as AI integration in creative tools becomes more widespread, the need for AI literacy and preparedness will only continue to grow.' https://dialogiclearning.com/

However, AI does not have a moral compass. Students will now be the architects of the future and the ethical aspects associated with it. As a College, we are embracing the educational opportunities AI provides, while still needing to ensure academic honesty with student produced (not Al generated) work. The College is investing in a number of strategies and apps for identifying plagiarised or AI generated texts. Drafts for assessment tasks are vitally important so that teachers can see students developing their own thinking and task responses. These drafts can take a range of forms including: written text, a developing product, a reflective conference about ideas and processes, student planning documents etc. Students in Years 3-6 will focus on how to cite references, create bibliographies, paraphrase, take notes and write content from their own perspective. Students and teachers in Years 7-12 will focus on ensuring student work is self-generated and avoids plagiarism, collusion, duplication of work and AI generation. The 'Academic Honesty Procedure' document will outline in full the College and student responsibilities.

SUBMISSIONS AND DEADLINES - COLLEGE PROCEDURES

This document aims to support students to develop their executive function skills, particularly organisation, sustained attention, and perseverance, by planning and adhering to draft and final assignment submission timelines. Students focus on developing these in the Junior Years, and consolidate them in Years 7-12. This 'Submissions and Deadlines' procedure is also intended to support students to attain their highest level of achievement. Task clarity and teachers regularly checking in with student progress, are essential to supporting students with their ability to meet submission deadlines and task quality. These procedures aim to ensure students have a clear process and appropriate support for achieving this, with transparency about procedures and communication involved in the 'Submission and Deadlines' process.

Assessment tasks need to be submitted during class lessons by the due date unless an extension has been granted at least two days in advance and recorded on an 'Application for Extension' form which can be found on SEQTA Learn. Completion of this form does not guarantee an extension as teacher discretion will determine if there is sufficient reason to grant it, taking into account student investment in class time, personal circumstances and other criteria.

Further details of both procedural documents will follow in an email. I encourage you to read these and share them with your children, particularly in Years 7-12. We will launch these with students in the first week of Term 2. We look forward to partnering with families as we ethically navigate the Artificial Intelligence era and continue to provide educational excellence for our students.

UPCOMING SCIENCE COMPETITIONS AND EVENTS IN TERM 2

Are you interested in Science and STEM opportunities?

BIG SCIENCE COMPETITION

Held during May, the Big Science Competition is a 50 minute, multiple choice competition testing science knowledge, critical-thinking and problem-solving skills. Questions are set in real-life, contemporary contexts, making them relatable (and interesting)! This competition is for students in Years 7 to 10 and questions are aligned with the Australian Curriculum – Science. Students receive a certificate indicating their performance and could win possible prizes or be invited to further Science Olympiads and Curios Minds – girls in STEM.

SCIENCE AND ENGINEERING CHALLENGE

On Wednesday 14 June up to 32 students from Year 9 and 10 will be competing in the Science and Engineering Challenge held at Flinders University.

Students will compete against other schools in fun and engaging hands-on activities such as designing an earthquake proof tower, building a hovercraft or bridge, providing electricity to a city or creating an environmentally friendly house. Qualifying schools may go on to compete at a State Final, and eight winning schools from around Australia are invited to compete at a one-day National Final each year.



MISSION TO MARS EXCURSION

During Futures Week, up to 26 Year 9 students may elect to visit Hamilton Secondary College Space School where students experience two Mars Missions. This mission enables students to operate as both astronauts on the Mars Surface and Scientists in Mission Control. This will be followed by a 'Mars Geology' practical analysing 'Mar's samples and data' collected. More information to come in Term 2!


