

# STAGE 1 TOURISM EXCURSION

Students from the Stage 1 Tourism class participated in a field study of McLaren Vale on 23 August. The aim of the investigation was to determine whether tourism has had a positive impact on the region. Students considered the triple bottom line (positive and negative environmental, economic and social aspects).

The class visited a variety of locations including the McLaren Vale Visitor Centre, Robern Menz Chocolates, Maxwell's Maze, D'Arenberg Cube, Hardy's Tintara Winery Art Gallery and The Ebert Family's Bed and Breakfast. They also conducted surveys of tourists, businesses and local residents to further ascertain the potential impacts of tourism and discover the opinions of different interest groups.

Thank you to Cathy at the McLaren Vale Visitor Centre who spoke to us about the number of different tourists and attractions in the area and the impact this has on the community and Lisa from Robern Menz Chocolates who shared some of their history. Special thanks also to the D'Arenberg Winery who went out of their way to allow our students through the cube at very short notice and without cost. We are extremely grateful as the majority of our students had never been before and said it was the best part of the day.

- gender balance;
- social factors in either maintaining or separating students;
- student feedback;
- parent communication based on sound educational reasoning received by Monday 17 September; and
- subject choices which can alter what class placements are possible as students move from Year 8 into 9 and then the Senior School from Year 10 onwards.

If you wish to make a time to speak to your child's class teacher about a specific issue, please contact them to make a time for another meeting.



# **EARLY MATHS MATTERS**

As a previous classroom teacher I loved teaching Maths. Why? Because when working out Maths sums or problems there is always a right or wrong answer and the process is systematic. An area of the JS Learning Enhancement support is working with those students who need further support to develop their understanding of Maths. While, I work with small groups of students from Reception to Year 2, Amanda Southern works with students in Years 3-6. Our focus is to ensure that students have secure foundational skills in Maths to allow them to progress further in their understanding. Some of these key foundational skills include: confidently counting forwards and backwards in different steps, recalling number facts (e.g. 7+3=10 and 10-7=3) and multiplication facts. Once students are secure with these skills we can then develop their skills and understanding in the classroom.

With the right maths tools, there are lots of ways you can support your child's Maths understanding at home with number and multiplication facts, money, telling the time and involving children in cooking and measuring. You can even make maths fun with games like Snakes and Ladders and Uno or a pack of cards.



A wonderful parent resource is the book, 'Unlock Your Child's Natural Maths Ability'. This book presents the Maths strategies as they are taught at school and provides ideas for supporting students from Reception to Year 4 or try the maths computer game <a href="https://www.ictgames.com">www.ictgames.com</a> which is loads of fun.

# **BOOKMARKING**

Throughout this year students in Reception, Year 1 and Year 2 classes have gone on a different learning journey with their writing. Teachers have provided writing choices to student writers that has empowered and helped them to assume more responsibility for their own learning.

Children have a choice about:

- What they write about
- How they make their books
- The illustrations in their books
- What kind of book that they make

'Bookmaking' has taken a giant leap in providing ownership for writing. When students write their own books, they are writing for a real purpose. Often the books are shared with each other at the end of the lesson, with other year levels, with parents and recently have been on display for everyone to see in our Library.

Nudge or Push? With assistance, every student can do more than they can by themselves working within the limits set by the state of his or her own development. We call this nudging. During the mini lessons teachers will explain a craft of writing and students are nudged towards this in their own writing. During conferences, teachers work with



students either independently or in small groups nudging them towards a craft taught. This is where feedback is given and goals are set for the upcoming writing lessons. Daily sharing of learning ends the lesson. Student's often sit in the 'author's chair to share their books with others. This is a very exciting time as children really do see themselves as authors.

# REDEVELOPMENT

Throughout the life of the College, the Library has evolved to meet the changing needs of students and staff. Over the past 18 months Library staff have undertaken the task of reinventing this space in order to create a fresh, new learning hub within the school.

This process involved extensive consultation and active research both within the College and with external providers, gaining new ideas and perspectives on how spaces, services and resources could be used. Staff also visited a number of innovative learning institutions across Adelaide to discuss, plan and imagine the potential for Tatachilla.

Key priorities were established to connect with the College Strategic Directions and Learning Principles, to improve and transform the physical learning spaces, resource collections, curriculum and accessibility to library services. Opportunities were also created for greater involvement in extra-curricular activities.

There was a need for specific learning 'zones' to exist within the Library, so that students could have areas for quiet reading, sustained independent study, Reader's Workshop and collaborative learning, as well as engagement with gallery spaces, exhibitions and hands-on art, craft and STEM activities. After a lengthy planning phase involving everything from computer simulations and blueprint sketches to Lego models, a selection of new furniture and rearrangement of existing shelving were put into place.

The development of each learning 'zone' also necessitated the relocation of every book and resource, which provided an opportunity to rearrange the print collections in both Junior and Middle School. Students have relished the opportunity to browse for their favourite authors and series within a specific genre, rather than by alphabetical order. This in turn, has significantly improved the circulation and borrowing across the sub-schools. Similarly, the establishment of Reader's Workshop and progressively, Writer's Workshop during Library class sessions have led to a flourishing culture of reading at Tatachilla. The regular and structured time spent with teacher-librarians has allowed students to develop reading stamina, extend their connections with texts and build a love for literature.

The Tatachilla Library has become a vibrant and productive centre for students, staff and the College community. We provide opportunities for Junior School students to take part in lunchtime art, craft and STEM activities, as well as seasonal events, such as 'Winter Reads', where Middle School students are able to listen, chat and connect with staff members as they share excerpts from a range of treasured books. Likewise, the 'Authors in Residence' program, Premier's Reading Challenge and CBCA Book Week celebrations have continued to be a staple part of the Library experience at the College.

The future vision for the growth of the Library includes the added features of gallery and exhibition spaces to showcase student learning and highlight community events, as well as the ongoing development of our online services. We look forward to continuing this journey, fostering a love of literature and offering a variety of rich learning experiences.

The Library is open Monday to Friday 8.30am - 4.00pm (closed at recess).

# **CAMBODIA MOVIE FUNDRAISER**

On Monday 6 August the Cambodia team held a Movie & Silent Auction fundraiser at the Capri Theatre, Goodwood.

A crowd of almost 200 people enjoyed a fun-filled evening watching Ocean's 8 and making a bid in the Silent Auction.

The purpose of this event was to raise funds to assist the local Lutheran Church outreach centre in a small village called Krus in central Cambodia. In most recent conversation with the Cambodian nationals we have planned for the funds to go towards building two classrooms in order to support the education of preschool aged children. In previous years, the College has raised funds to purchase a motor bike for the local pastors and teachers to access other remote areas, as well as building four modest homes for people in need.

Throughout the planning phase of the night our team set a target of raising \$5000 and brainstormed the possible ways of getting local business to support our cause through donating goods and services to go towards the silent auction.

Each student contacted business they had a relationship with already, as well as connecting with new businesses. At first, approaching these businesses was a bit scary as we were stepping out of our comfort zone but we soon learned that our wider community was open and willing to support us as they also connected with the cause. This encouraged us to source even more donations and we were so overwhelmed with everyones generosity. We sincerely thank the following business for your generous support:


