## From the PRINCIPAL

#### **CHALLENGE, INSIGHT AND ALTRUISM!**

During the course of the final three weeks of term a number of year levels have partaken in their camping experiences for the year. This has included the Year 1 Sleepover, the Year 2 Camp, Year 4 Camp, Year 5 Camp, Year 10 Camp and the two-week trip to Cambodia for our Year 11 students.

I am blessed to be experiencing the highs of the Year 10 Camp this week, situated in The Grampians, Victoria. The camp allows for 'exploration' or 'adventure' throughout the western part of Victoria. The exploration experience has taken students to Ballarat, Port Campbell and around the Grampians region, while the adventure stream has undertaken bike riding, abseiling, canoeing, bush-walking and high ropes in the immediate vicinity of Halls Gap.

The College provides these learning experiences so that individual students are allowed a space and place to further grow, develop, be challenged, experience environments that are new and discover new insights about themselves, their peers and the world in which we exist.

It has been heartening for me to witness first hand the personal and group challenges that have been accomplished by our students. There are the more complex, emotive challenges such as overcoming a fear of heights, connecting with new friends away from usual friends or spending time away from home. There are also less emotive, but just as difficult challenges in their own way such as learning a new card game, completing a Rubik's Cube or even packing a bag for camp!

Through such challenges comes new insights and even paradigm shifts, allowing students to see the world in a new way, but importantly see themselves in a new way – this is a powerful outcome.

Sometimes when students return home from these events, you can get lots of chatter about all the experiences, but sometimes it can be limited. Consider using some of these questions to gain a deeper insight into your child's mind after their camping times away:

- What happened on camp that made you laugh?
- What games did you play while at camp?
- Who did you admire for doing something courageous on camp? Why?
- How did you help someone on camp?
- How did someone help you on camp?
- What did you learn about yourself on camp?
- What is one thing you learnt on camp that you hope to use again in the future?

Camp programs really hit the spot for educators when students demonstrate altruism in their interactions and development. Our students in Cambodia, are experiencing this first hand, as mature, educated, ethical young learners who are seeking to serve the local people of Cambodia. Their own self-sacrifice of the creature comforts of home will allow the current and future generations of Cambodia to have the kickstart to life that we are so easily given.

I commend each student for the manner in which they embrace and engage in these learning activities. I especially thank the staff, teaching and support, parent helpers and volunteers who all attend and give of their time away from their families, to allow such incredible opportunities for our students! I thank you all.

#### **CLASS PLACEMENTS 2019**

- student feedback:

- subject choices which can alter what class placements are possible as students move from Year 8 into 9 and then the Senior School from Year 10 onwards.

#### **CURRICULUM MATTERS**

### Teaching and Learning is personalised, innovative and challenging

In the last few weeks the Junior School has been a buzz with so many examples of personalised, innovative and challenging learning. Reception students and staff have been mesmerised and challenged by the wonderful incursion by Sarah Roberts from the Aldinga Library with her range of robotics and innovative coding challenges ranging from mini Ozobots for which students created coded pathways and Dash robots that students programmed, to creating music by combining robotics with bananas and plasticine. I highly recommend a visit to the Aldinga Library to see the many robotics and coding opportunities they provide during the upcoming holidays.

Last week the Year 2s culminated their STEM approach to learning with a highly engaging and challenging few days of creating and testing their thinking and design skills coming up with ways that a community could transport necessary items across a creek. Deepening their understanding of forces that impact movement, including push and pull, through the conceptual lens of cause, effect and connection, students innovated to create their own pulley systems, ziplines, ramps and bridges out of materials such as wooden reels, balloons, string, buckets and piping. Seeing the students heightened engagement with their learning through trialling, appraising and modifying multiple times amid screams of, "We did it!", was indeed exciting.

The Student-led Conferences was also a fabulous forum where students shared their personalised learning with their parents and caregivers. It provided a wonderful opportunity for students to talk authentically about some of their learning goals and learning highlights across many areas, including specialist lessons such as Japanese, PE, Visual Arts and Performing Arts.

Another highlight was the opportunity for several staff members to attend an after-school presentation by Donalyn Miller, a world leader in the current reader's workshop approach to reading, and author of books including, 'The Book Whisperer' and Game Changer'. Her key messages focused on the importance of providing children with time for reading, access to a broad and varied range of books (fiction and non-fiction), choice for children amidst such a reading range of texts (local and school libraries being wonderful resources) and developing a sense of community as readers (at school, at home with family, friends, book clubs etc.) Donalyn's message is supported by research highlighting how reading performance increases with access to self-selected texts. Below is a link, based on extensive surveys of children, outlining the kinds of books children from different ages enjoy selecting. This might assist you to expand both your home libraries and the kinds of books you share with your child from additional libraries. The extensive findings of children's reading influences are available on the report link provided.

## from the head of MIDDLE SCHOOL



#### WHEN THE HAND, HEART AND HEAD STARTS MOVING TOGETHER

It has been a real joy to see the hands, hearts and heads of our Year 9s moving together to make change in their world in the Crossroads Program this

term. When this happens a transformation inside the learner begins that takes them to a deeper place of meaning and purpose. The act of service learning creates moments of transcendence for our young people where they learn about the stories of how human beings encounter and overcome adversity.

After hearing stories from students and staff who have served on our service projects in the Northern Territory, Cambodia and Shepparton the Year 9s became a part of the transformation for these communities by creating stalls to raise money for the real needs in these communities. Lunchtime on the Wednesday, Thursday and Friday of Week 9 was a sea of people coming together in purpose, love and service to others. Thank you for supporting the Year 9s through the Service Festival which has raised \$5000 for our Service Partnerships.



It is our hope that the Year 9s are moved by this service learning experience and they respond to the call to become a part of the service trips in the future.

### HISTORY OF COLLEGE'S SERVICE PROJECTS SHEPPARTON

When did we begin going there? November 2012

Why do we serve? Through the Lutheran Church Australia International Mission a partnership with Shepparton Lutheran Church formed, due to the large African population at the church and in the community. The Schoolies Alternative Trip began with an idea of our Youth Worker at the time to be able to offer a positive alternative to celebrate their end of schooling instead of just the Schoolies Festival.

How do we serve and connect with the people of this community? This trip focuses on relationship building with the Shepparton community. There is a lot of time spent playing soccer, games, swimming, socialising and getting to know people's stories and journeys of how they came to Australia. There are also practical service projects carried out for the church community or others within the community.



#### **NORTHERN TERRITORY**

When did we begin going there? July 2013

Why do we serve? The Lutheran Church has a living vital relationship with Indigenous culture that goes back over a hundred years. Today the LCA, through the Finke River Mission (FRM), exercises a very special relationship with Indigenous communities in the Northern Territory. Through this special relationship, Lutheran schools have established connections with remote Indigenous communities for the purpose of service learning and inter-cultural development. The following outcomes are sought through this partnership:

- facilitating an understanding of our mission heritage and ongoing opportunities to share the faith
- promoting global cultural and citizenship awareness
- building connections across communities including church, parents, staff, students, service organisations
- identifying practical and sustainable projects in consultation with FRM and Indigenous communities

How do we serve and connect with the people of this community? Originally the service was heavily focused around doing practical acts of service both for the FRM facilities and the bush churches and spaces in the communities. However, this was always intended to be a means to develop relationships with people in the community. These days, while there are still practical acts of service done, there is a greater focus on connecting with people. This is done through all kinds of activities, from sport, to craft/painting, church, learning about culture, and of course the ministry of presence.

#### **CAMBODIA**

When did we begin going there? 2015

Why do we serve? To move our young people beyond a mono cultural world view to reach out to our brothers and sisters in our world, in particular Cambodia. Through the Lutheran Church Australia International Mission a partnership with Krux Village and the Lutheran Church community and Pastors were formed.

How do we serve and connect with the people of this community? The service element historically occurred through our connection with Krux Village. We do volunteer at Transform, an organisation that educates and cares for young children, but our Lutheran links are the key to our immersion and also our service.

What are the needs of the community? Education and rebuilding communities. The needs that we serve change with every trip as we respond to the needs of the community. Some times this has been providing transport through fundraising for a motorbike, to building homes, to teaching English, etc.

**How can we help the community?** Hands on work, help to sustain the community with relevant skills they need development in and educating our students about the history of the people and the need for world awareness.

## from the head of SENIOR SCHOOL



While the Year 10s have been out on camp this week, the Year 12s have experienced an alternative timetable, including trial exams and subject workshops, to prepare them for the conclusion of courses and SACE examinations in order to finish their academic year. Students can look forward

to feedback on their exams in Week 1 of next term. May I encourage you, as parents, to take part in the reflection of trial examination performance by discussing your child's achievement in their exams. Students should be encouraged to move beyond consideration of the grade achieved to also reflect upon their areas of strength and focus for the final examination. Knowledge and understanding of the subject are key areas to consider, but exam skills are just as important to unpack as areas for improvement.

SACE rules have recently changed regarding the beginning of exams. Where students were only able to read through their paper during this time, they are now able to write in their papers and response booklets. Year 12 students are reminded that reading through the entire paper to its conclusion is the recommended strategy at the commencement of the exam.

Next term is a short yet busy time for Year 12 students. Parents have been provided with a letter outlining key dates and events. Parents may also be interested to know that

the SACE exam timetable is available to view on the SACE website and students have been made aware of the times for examinations. I would like to take this opportunity to wish the Year 12 students every success in their final studies and examinations.



Student academic reports for Term 3 will be available to view from Friday Week 10. Please take time to discuss the results of this report – academic and work habits – with your young person. Students in Year 10 and 11 have a number of weeks of learning in Term 4 to be able to build on this achievement and prepare for exams. Students are encouraged to consider creating a study schedule in the holidays so that there is room for revision from the beginning of the term. This will make revision effective and ensure that not all exam preparation is crammed in to the revision week at school.

Senior students are respectfully reminded to adhere to the rules for student driving and parking while on the property. Should any driver information change – such as the registration of the car or the passengers that may travel with the driver, we need to know. Students have been advised that, should they park at the rear of the property, they are to enter and exit the College on foot via the main College stairway and not by a short cut through Middle School.

#### PIERRE DE COUBERTIN AWARD

Each year, secondary schools across Australia are invited to nominate one recipient for the Pierre de Coubertin Award. Each nominee must participate actively in the school's physical education program with a consistently positive attitude and must have represented the school in a sport. This year we are proud to announce that Jordan Plaice is the recipient of the Pierre de Coubertin Award.

The Pierre de Coubertin Award recognises secondary school students who demonstrate values which are consistent with the Olympic Movement through participation in sporting activities. More than 16,500 young Australians have received the Award since its inception in 1993 including some of the 2016 Rio Olympic Medallists.

#### Jordan Plaice has

represented the College in a number of sports throughout his time at Tatachilla as well as assisting with coaching SAPSASA Boys Basketball and Yr 8/9 Boys Basketball and also refereeing along the way. Jordan can always be trusted to show great



sportsmanship and leadership on and off the field. He has also served the College as a House Captain with vigour and is an excellent role model to his peers. His attitude is always positive and he often sets the scene for those around him.

Jordan's nomination included a written piece on this year's theme for the literary submission on 'Which Olympic Athlete has been a role model to you and how?'

"LeBron James, an American NBA player who has represented America in three Olympic games. His early life was a struggle; his mother was 16 years old when he was born, and his father had an extensive criminal record. He was eventually fostered by a football coach who introduced him to the life of sport. Since starting to play basketball myself I have loved watching LeBron play, collecting his jerseys and even pretending to be him out on the court when playing with friends! He has become a sports idol to me as I enjoy everything about his game, the way he plays and the fact that he has put in so much effort to overcome early hardships and appreciated what the sport has to offer. I admire his ability to be self-motivated, his grit and determination on the court as well as his humour off the court which demonstrates his ability to not take himself too seriously in spite of his fame. He is a team player having taken on the advice of an early coach about how 'great players make their teammates better.' He is passionate about helping children in need through charities, never forgetting his roots and a strong support of his mother. To me, he demonstrates the Olympian spirit - trying his best, being a team player, not giving and encouraging others. LeBron has always been an inspiration to me and will still continually motivate me to play and enjoy the game of basketball."

Jordan received his award on Monday 17 September after attending an Academy Day where he was able to listen to Olympic Athletes and hear more about the Olympic movement.


### SPORTS FIELDS




