#### THINGS THAT COME IN THREES

In addition to the three wise men and the three little pigs, Reception classes at Tatachilla Lutheran College will also come in threes from next year. The College is offering an additional 25 Reception places in 2018, and there is already strong interest from the community in securing them. This heralds a period of change and opportunity for the Junior School, and importantly, many things about the Junior School will not change.

What will change? We are currently in the design development phase of plans for upgrading the current Reception Learning Centre to house three classrooms. The architect has reconfigured the internal walls, and extended the building out on three sides, to create three, spacious learning spaces that will have access to covered areas outside, directly from the classroom. They will also have interconnecting doors, to allow the classes to come together when they want to, and to have their own discrete

learning space. We anticipate that the redeveloped building will promote collaboration, a flexible approach to the use of space, creativity and a closer connection to the natural environment that we have in abundance at Tatachilla. The building project will require the 2018 Reception classes to be housed in temporary accommodation until the work is complete. Details of this are currently under consideration.

Many things will stay the same. Our expert Reception teachers, all the necessary resources for learning and teaching, access to our specialist teachers and the curriculum will be in place for the three classes next year. What we provide for two classes will be replicated for the third. In each Reception classroom there will be a program that allows students to learn the important foundational literacy and numeracy skills at their individual point of challenge.

Opportunities abound. We are providing 25 additional places for families to experience a Christian education and to further promote the

values that we share as a community. The Junior School campus will be redeveloped to accommodate the additional class, providing a dynamic environment for the quality teaching and learning that takes place every day. This will be planned in the context of the master planning process which is about to begin.

The College has a strong belief in the positive learning and wellbeing benefits of providing additional enrolment opportunities for our community. We are excited about this new announcement for our community and look forward to providing the ongoing excellence in education, pastoral care and strong Christian values for which our College is known.

We appreciate your understanding through this time of exciting change for our community and encourage you to seek any clarification you may require.

#### **CURRICULUM MATTERS**

#### REPORTING ON STUDENT LEARNING

Ongoing assessment and feedback about student learning to parents and students occurs in many ways across the course of a year. NAPLAN provides a snapshot of learning for Year 3 and 5 students in relation to school and national results as well as very helpful information for teachers about individual student learning growth over two years, curriculum strengths and school trends. Semester reports are another form of feedback on student learning. These reports are school generated with Semester 1 reporting on learning progress and Semester 2 reports documenting end of year achievement. Parent/teacher interviews in Term 1 and student-led conferences in Term 3 provide another insight into student learning. Students in Years 1-6 also complete mathematics, reading and spelling assessments in October each year which provide us with learning progress data for each student that can be tracked throughout their time at the College in Years 1-9.

Powerful and exciting sharing of student learning also occurs when students plan and share their knowledge, understandings and skills with parents in forums such as the recent Year 4 Recycling/Reusing Exhibition. The level of student excitement and parent engagement in the evening was exceptional. Students not only learnt to interact with and share their thinking and learning with numerous parents, but also how to act, communicate and respond in a formal gallery setting. Congratulations to the Year 4 students, teachers and parents on a wonderful gallery experience showcasing student learning. Stay tuned for a range of ways students in different year levels will be sharing and reporting on their learning with you this year.

#### **KABOOM PERCUSSION**

Last Tuesday we were visited by Cat and Josh from Kaboom Percussion. Both freelance percussionists based in Perth, they have a wide range of musical experience between them and have been working together for the past decade. They both work as performers, instrumental teachers, ensemble directors and composers, and they play a mean cup!

Cat has a Masters degree from the University of Western Australia, and plays regularly with the WA Symphony Orchestra.

Josh has a Masters degree from the WA Academy of Performing Arts, and has made numerous trips to Hungary to study the cimbalom (a hammered dulcimer: a type of chordophone composed of a large box with metal strings stretched across its top).

They inspired and amazed our Years 4-6 students, showing the exciting possibilities of music through the world of percussion. Cat and Josh used brooms, cups, chairs and body percussion mixed with magic, juggling, and laughter to truly entertain us. Students were also part of this interactive performance and were invited to create rhythms as part of their show. We will follow up this performance with various activities in our Performing Arts lessons during the rest of this term.



#### **NATIONAL RECONCILIATION WEEK 2017**

Each year, National Reconciliation Week celebrates and builds on respectful relationships shared by Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples and the wider Australian community. It is a time for all Australians to learn about shared histories, cultures and achievements, and to explore how each of us can join, and positively contribute to the nation's reconciliation journey.

Reconciliation Week is book ended by two important anniversaries. One being 27 May 1967 – on this day, a referendum saw more than 90% of Australians vote to give the Australian Government power to make laws for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people and recognise them in the Census. And two; 3 June 1992 the High Court delivered the Mabo Decision, the culmination of Eddie Koiki Mabo's challenge to the legal fiction of 'terra nullius' (land belonging to no one) and leading to the legal recognition of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples as the Traditional Owners and Custodians of lands.

This year those dates as especially significant being the 50th Anniversary of the Referendum and the 25th of the Mabo decision. The theme for NRW 2017, 'Let's take the next steps', invites all Australians to join in the next stage of the nation's reconciliation story. #### NATIONAL DISABILITY DATA COLLECTION

In Term 3, our College will be taking part in the Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (NCCD). All Government, Independent and Catholic schools will be completing this data collection across Australia. This requires the College to provide the Australian Government, Department of Education, with data relating to support provided to students with disabilities.

All information provided to the Department is de-identified and aggregated sufficiently so that no individual student's identity can be reasonably ascertained. The College is currently in the process of collating this information, which will be submitted in August.

If you do not want our College to provide de-identified data about your child to the Australian Government Department of Education, you can 'opt-out'; this involves completing an opt-out form. Please contact Karen Turner on 8323 4403 if you have any further questions or wish to opt out. If you do not advise you wish to opt-out, de-identified information about your child will be included in the 2017 data collection.




