BECOME A PART OF THE INNOVATION AND CREATIVITY IN THE MIDDLE YEARS

We are delighted to be able to grow enterprise skills for our young people with our new Year 7 learning spaces at Tatachilla Lutheran College that will have a significant upgrade when \$1.2million is invested over the next 6 months in preparation for 2018.

The construction of a new learning space for an additional Year 7 class to commence from 2018, will also allow for the establishment of a dedicated STEM learning space.

The STEM space will consist of a purpose-built workshop facility along with an enclosed technology hub with some of the latest technology to be used in education. The STEM learning space will combine the curriculum areas of Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics to allow for an integrated, theoretical and practical approach to learning for students.

STEM learning spaces are critical to the jobs of the future and addressing the current gap in growth industries globally. The areas of STEM are amongst the fastest growing occupations in the world, and specialist spaces such as these are aimed at engaging and exciting students through deep learning that will allow them to consider future STEM occupational pathways and develop enterprise skills that will be needed in all careers.

ENTERPRISE SKILLS – NEW SKILLS FOR THE FUTURE WORKFORCE

We recently saw enterprise skills in action in the Year 9 Specialness Display where our young people utilised problem solving, communication, digital literacy, teamwork presentation, critical thinking, creativity and financial literacy skills to produce a project that displayed their talents.

We saw young entrepreneurs in action as they designed new concepts, ideas, products, films, paintings, photographs, computers, drones, sculptures and music that we have never seen before. All of the learning experiences that these students had in Year 7 and 8 led to this moment of entrepreneurship,

innovation and creativity. Through creating a rich curriculum with enterprise skills as the foundation our graduates leave us prepared to engage with the future workforce and tertiary institutions.

We invite you in becoming a part of these exciting developments by being part of the courtyard design and purchasing a brick for your children and family. Details about purchasing a brick and supporting this fundraising appeal can be found in this Newsletter edition. There will a special opening and celebration for all the families who have donated to this fundraising appeal once the building project is completed.





TREE PLANTING

This week our Junior School classes have been planting the new Koala Feedlot on the eastern side of the College as part of National Tree Day for Schools. Tatachilla's partnership with Cleland Wildlife Park continues to grow. Branches will be collected by Cleland staff to feed koalas when the trees are mature.

You may be wondering what the earthworks are on the western side of the main entry driveway and the EcoClassroom.

The planting of this area has been intended for a number of years as part of the enhancement upon entry to the College.

The environmental team and Property Services are working together to create the 'College Swamp'.

These earthworks are integral to the development of the Swamp and direct the flow of stormwater, collecting some water in shallow depressions where specific plant species will be planted to form the swamp. Plantings are based on the locally threatened 'Ingelburne Swamp' (1km south on California Rd). Some planting in this area has taken place this week and students and staff will be involved in collection of seed and propagation of seedlings which will be planted as part of National Tree Day 2018. A boardwalk will be built in the near future and this will meander throughout the area with interpretive signage included.


YEAR 3 LEARNING

In 3B we have had a busy but engaging and fun term of learning and growth so far. In 3B students have been very engaged in our Earth and Space Science inquiry unit. Students have been exploring the earth, moon and sun and investigating how the earth's rotation on its axis causes regular changes, including night and day. The students have enjoyed exploring how and why we have seasons and years, have created diagrams, asked lots of interesting questions and shared amazing facts. We hope to discover the answers to some of our questions and explore the rest of the amazing solar system.

During our Health and Bounce Back unit this term we have been exploring how a balanced, safe and respectful community supports personal wellbeing and health. By looking at a holistic approach to health and wellbeing students have discovered that our mental, spiritual and social health is just as important as our physical health. We have been exploring Growth versus Fixed Mindset and how a growth mindset can help us to grow, progress and improve as a learner. Positive thinking has helped us to take risks, challenge ourselves, show perseverance and persistence and encourage each other. Students have been learning about the Incredible 5 Point Scale with support from Emma Thomson and are implanting it to express and identify their emotions and feelings throughout the day. Students have shared strategies that help them to manage their feelings, emotions and worries such as mindfulness thinking, deep breathing, dropping your anchor, talking to friends and journaling.

On Thursday 8 June 3B and their buddy class 5B participated in tree planting. The students enjoyed working with their buddies to plant seedlings and plant out the new Koala Feedlot on the eastern side of the College as part of National Tree Day for Schools. It was wonderful for the students to work together to make a positive contribution to the local environment and support the koala population.

WRITING THE CLICKER WAY!

Within any classroom, when it comes to writing lessons, there is a mixed response from our students, ranging from "Yeah – writing is fab!", to "Writing.... oh NO!" Before independent writing can commence successfully, key learning around phonics, vocabulary, sight words and simple sentence patterns is necessary; plus, a student needs to have a selection of ideas and a boost of confidence to give it a go! Therefore, it is no surprise to find that in every classroom while some students are excited by writing, there are those students who find writing lessons terrifying.

I am excited to share a new program available to our emergent, developing or reluctant writers in Junior School. Clicker 7 is a child friendly word processor program. Key features include:

- Realistic speech recognition
- Intelligent word prediction
- Audio note creator
- Personalised visual cues


There is a Clicker Program to support each year level, and the introduction of Clicker allows students to be independent while learning the key skills of literacy.



Clicker Sentences (Years 1 and 2) Sentence writing made easy with visual cues and the grid template to support key vocabulary and sentence structure. The speech feedback function allows students to hear the word before selecting it.



Clicker Connect (Years 3 and 4). Words and phrases are presented in clusters. As each sentence is written, it is spoken aloud in a child's voice, helping learners to review and correct what they have written.



Clicker Docs (Years 5 and 6). The simplified lower case keyboard allows students to easily type into Clicker Docs and when they punctuate a sentence their work is read back to them. This helps them to find and correct errors for themselves, so that they become independent writers.

NATIONAL DISABILITY DATA COLLECTION

In Term 3, our College will be taking part in the Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (NCCD). All Government, Independent and Catholic schools will be completing this data collection across Australia. This requires the College to provide the Australian Government, Department of Education, with data relating to support provided to students with disabilities.

All information provided to the Department is de-identified and aggregated sufficiently so that no individual student's identity can be reasonably ascertained. The College is currently in the process of collating this information, which will be submitted in August.

If you do not want our College to provide de-identified data about your child to the Australian Government Department of Education, you can 'opt-out'; this involves completing an opt-out form. Please contact Karen Turner on 8323 4403 if you have any further questions or wish to opt out. If you do not advise you wish to opt-out, de-identified information about your child will be included in the 2017 data collection.

SENIOR SCHOOL EXAMS

Term 2 is always a busy term and with the end of Semester just around the corner we took some time this week in assembly to focus on examination preparation and protocols.

Year 10 examinations will take place in Week 8, 21 - 23 June. Students will be expected to attend school as usual and, when not participating in examinations, will be able to revise during timetabled class time.

The examination experience for Year 11 students varies to that of Year 10s. Year 11 examinations will occur throughout Week 8, 19 - 23 June. Students of Stage 1 subjects are expected to attend examinations only in this week. However, for those who prefer to revise at school a designated study space is available for revision.

Students are reminded that they must wear full winter uniform for examinations. Equipment is to be carried in a clear plastic bag and students are requested to arrive at the examination room 10 minutes prior to the start time.

Examination timetables have been issued to students and Year Level Co-ordinators and Home Class teachers have assisted students with advice regarding personal study timetables.

Preparation for examinations is vital to student success. Allocating study time, as opposed to homework time, into a personal schedule can be a challenge for students organising themselves for examinations for the first time. However, systematic and dedicated time spent on revision for subject material is just part of the focus for examination preparation. Students should also look closely at revision guides for the skills that they will be expected to demonstrate. The completion of previous years' papers and questions within examinations can pay dividends for performance.

While we acknowledge that examinations may make some students nervous, we also know that providing the experience of working in test conditions can enable students to familiarise themselves with the process ahead of Year 12. Students are encouraged to engage wholeheartedly and are challenged to do their personal best in these assessments. In some cases, examination performance can inform future subject choices and pathways – so it is important that students treat the matter seriously.

I wish the Year 10 and 11 students every success in their examinations and look forward to celebrating their achievements at the end of the term.

In this week's newsletter, we introduce an item that helps you get to know about our Senior School teachers. Here, Art Teacher extraordinaire Ms Skye McVicar tells us a little about herself.

What made you choose teaching as a career and how long have you been teaching?

When my kids started Kindy I realised that going back to work in theatre full time wasn't really going to be possible in Adelaide as there wasn't enough work and I didn't have the contacts that I had in Sydney. Therefore, I wanted to look at a career where I could still talk about art every day and interact with others who are interested in this area. I have been teaching for four years.

What is the best part of being a teacher?

When I see my students doing well in their own work. When I know that they are proud of their work and they accomplished more than they thought they could. I love celebrating that work by displaying it somewhere around the school. I also love it when a student takes me by surprise and asks something or makes a comment that I hadn't even thought about myself. It makes the lesson and learning fun and spontaneous.



What is the worst part of being a teacher?

Having to use behaviour management skills to encourage students to listen or engage with work. I much prefer to spend valuable time with students teaching my subject and sharing my skills and passion with the enthusiasm and joy that I have for it. I respect students and I expect the same respect in return.

Your most memorable moment as a teacher is...

When a Year 12 student from last year gave me a card at the end of the year saying that Art Class was always a happy place for her - a place where she felt like she was allowed to be herself and was encouraged. I didn't even realise that this student was particularly keen on the subject. my teaching style or my lessons as she didn't talk about her personal feelings during the time she was in my class. So teaching has a unique and powerful impact for student and teacher when both are engaged on achieving excellence. It brought a tear to my eyes when I read it and at the time I thought what I am doing for the passionate students in my classes is more important and valuable in the long run than if I had a successful exhibition of my own.

When I'm not teaching, you can find me...

Painting, painting, painting! Also, I love walking in nature and being around the greenness of the natural world and reading spiritual books.

This process enables students to gain a deeper understanding of the challenges when working in the hospitality industry. The opportunity to design their own two course menu was the most enjoyable aspect for many. The most demanding aspect of this is task is time management, especially due to the limitations of lesson times and lunch periods. A sense of community is also developed through staff and students' interactions and is an added benefit of this assignment. Guests are asked to provide feedback to the students and this is incredibly encouraging for our budding "chefs".

At the commencement of Year 8, students in Home Economics start their very own recipe book in which they begin compiling a large range of recipes from soups and sauces through to cakes and slices. TEACHING AND LEARNING

CURRICULUM REVIEW

In 2016, as part of our School Improvement Plan, we embarked upon a review of our curriculum offerings from Years 7-12. The aim of this review was to explore the range of contemporary subject offerings accessible to students to ensure that we are providing opportunities and pathways that cater for all of our students.

Following a rigorous interrogation of the current subjects offered, surveying the needs of students, parents and staff and comparing and contrasting our subject offerings with those provided by schools within the district and other Lutheran schools, we have identified a range of new subjects that will be offered from 2018.

Subjects include:

STAGE 2 - Nutrition, Cert III Fitness (on site)

STAGE 1 - Legal Studies, Tourism, Cert III Fitness (on site), AIE Cert II Creative Industries (Media) 3D Animation, Cert II Conservation Land Management with Cert III Captive Animals

YEAR 10 - Integrated Learning (Soccer Coaching focus)

YEAR 7 - Digital Technology

Digital Technologies will be rolled out from Years 7-10 from 2018 - 2021.

Details of the new subjects will be available in the 2018 Curriculum Guides which students will receive prior to the end of Term 2 ahead of the 2018 subject selection and counselling process.

STAGE 2 HOLIDAY TUITION

For students undertaking Stage 2 studies, the school year is rapidly approaching a conclusion. Students undertaking subjects with an external examination may be interested in the opportunities available for holiday tuition through either the Adelaide Tuition Centre or the University of Adelaide.

The following courses are available.

University of Adelaide - Biology, Chemistry, Mathematical Methods, Physics, and Specialist Mathematics.

Courses run for 5 days (3hrs/day) and cover all course content for a cost of \$340 (\$320 for early bird bookings before 20 June). www.adelaide.edu.au/learning and teaching/Professional and Continuing Education/Yr12 Tuition Courses

Adelaide Tuition Centre - Biology, Chemistry, English Literary Studies, Legal Studies, Mathematical Methods, Modern History, Physical Education, Physics, Psychology, and Specialist Mathematics.

Courses are offered on the basis of individual topics that run for 3 hours at a cost of \$70 per topic. In addition to the above examination preparation courses, the Adelaide Tuition Centre also offers a 3 hour course for Business and Enterprise – How to make a successful start to your report: Situation Analysis at a cost of \$70. www.adelaidetuition.com.au

Tatachilla entered three teams in the Bluewater (advanced) competition – Rhys Coventry, Lucas Schroeder and Oscar Anthoney (Open Boys); Caitlin Radbone (Open Girls); Mitchell Francis, Daniel Diack and Felix Bekkers (U16 Boys).



Each heat saw schools compete in teams of two and the surfers 3-wave combined scores for the 15 minute heat are judged to decide the placings.




