Week 8 is examination week for students in Years 10 and 11. Students' study in subjects culminates in examinations assessing topics and skills taught in Semester 1. It has been pleasing to observe the maturity of Year 11 students as they have undertaken their tests. Students have been punctual, well prepared by bringing the required equipment and have applied themselves in the time provided. Our Year 10 students have experienced examination week for the first time. While there have been some nerves evident, this cohort of students has also presented themselves in an adult manner during this three-day period of tests.

The big question on many of the students minds at this time is why do we still have examinations? In short - as long as universities and Stage 2 SACE subjects use this mechanism to assess student attainment, then we would be doing a dis-service to students if we did not expose them to the process of examination revision, study preparation and sitting the examinations themselves. The examination process provides rigour that challenges students academically, intellectually and personally. From a practical perspective, students at Tatachilla have approximately five sets of examinations prior to the final Year 12 assessments. When considered in this way, students should adopt the attitude that they are beginning preparation for their final year of compulsory education in Year 10.

Examination results are also used within the College to assist with the upcoming course counselling in Term 3. Results may form part of a pre-requisite for a future course or provide associated information for suitability for new courses. For example, should a student wish to enrol in Business and Enterprise at Stage 2, we expect that they will have achieved a B grade or better in the Stage 1 English examination.

I encourage students to consider the feedback from teachers in classes and on returned examination papers seriously. They are encouraged to talk to teachers wherever possible to seek advice since this is invaluable information that should be recorded and noted for improvement in examination performance in the second semester.

These examination experiences can reveal personal strengths and skills in the way that coursework is unable to. We also recognise that, when new to a student, examinations can challenge. The key with any disappointment in performance, is to consider the longterm opportunities for improvement. I encourage students to be honest in their reflections. If minimal study and revision has been undertaken and a disappointing result has eventuated, students should consider their own responsibility in the process and avoid discounting the situation or blaming. Reviewing results and exploring the reasons for them is a valuable learning experience when it comes to examinations.

I wish every senior student success in their forthcoming results and encourage parents and carers to discuss and reflect upon this information by discussing it together.

SENIOR SCHOOL

YR 10 INTEGRATED SCIENCE

Integrated Science is offered as an alternative to the 'Core Science' Program within the school. Although the topics studied are not exactly the same as those in the core subject, the students do cover the required outcomes as sought by the National Curriculum.







The class has studied a range of curriculum topics, including; Biology: DNA & Genetics – we found out that 6 of 17 students in the class are unable to 'roll their tongue'; Chemistry: the water in our Eco-Classroom pond is very healthy – as evidenced by the variety of Macroinvertebrates contained within it, including a 'Dragonfly Nimph' species, whilst many of the exhaust pipes of staff cars are quite clean (although the school mini-bus could do with a service); and Physics (STEM): we watched in awe as the 7 Star Hotel in Dubai, Burj Al Arab, was constructed & applied these principles to constructing our own bridges and structures for testing and evaluation.

Next semester we begin an Alternative Curriculum Unit

- 'Forensic Science' which will include: Crime Scene
Investigative Procedures: Patterning and Matching Evidence

- ABO blood types and fracture matching; and a Serial Crime
topic. Students will also be journeying to the SA Coroner's
Court and SA Criminal Court for an excursion.

All information provided to the Department is de-identified and aggregated sufficiently so that no individual student's identity can be reasonably ascertained. The College is currently in the process of collating this information, which will be submitted in August.

If you do not want our College to provide de-identified data about your child to the Australian Government Department of Education, you can 'opt-out'; this involves completing an opt-out form. If you do not advise you wish to opt-out, de-identified information about your child will be included in the 2017 data collection.

PAUL LAMBERT

In this week's edition of the newsletter, Mr Paul Lambert shares his wisdom and reflections as a teacher with 40 years experience.

What made you choose teaching as a career and how long have you been teaching for?



My father and brother were both builders and I have had a passion for building and design since childhood. My grandmother's family have been traced back six generations as builders in England. I chose teaching and "Boys Craft" as it was called back then as I loved working as a craftsman and was also interested in Science, the other part of my qualifications. I started teaching in 1974 at Taperoo High - that's over 40 years ago!

I have had a few changes from

teaching over those years, working as a storeman, foundation labourer, trainer of long term unemployed workers, carpenter/builder and meat worker.

Working with young people and introducing them to the world of learning by doing has always drawn me back to education.

What is the best part of being a teacher?

The best part of teaching for me is to follow the progress and work with students in such a huge and exciting growth time in their life, from Years 7-12. Following and working with bouncy, open, enthusiastic children on the cusp of being adults to the young adults who graduate.

I have a blessed position as I am able to work in an area that I love. Teaching in Design and Technology and previously in Doorways 2 Construction has enabled me to hand on skills that are a part of me and has enabled me to teach students by reaching students who do not otherwise fit into recognised academic patterns, enabling their success and progress.



What is the worst part of being a teacher?

A downside of teachers is that we all love to talk and meetings, and our need to talk can get in the way sometimes. I much prefer listening!

What is your most memorable moment as a teacher?

Working with students in the outdoors - I have led surfing trips to Kangaroo Island, snow trips to Victoria and New Zealand and fishing trips to Yorke Peninsula.

When I'm not teaching, you can find me

Surfing, fishing, walking, gardening, online shopping (ebay is my favourite!).

What is a passion, skill or interest that people would not know about you?

I am a beachcomber. I collect shells and pieces of junk and driftwood from beaches wherever I go. I started on the beach at Brighton and Seacliff when I was little and have picked up things from around the world since then. The things represent no monetary value but the beauty that I see in them and the memories they trigger. My ironstone rocks from Arno Bay, the fossil sea creature from Half Moon Bay, the twisted driftwood scrap from Medewi are all junk but I like them.

THE BENEFITS OF MINDFULNESS IN SCHOOLS

Mindfulness is the practice of quieting the mind and bringing attention to the present. Just think about that. How often, during a day, do you get to quiet your mind and focus on the present? When is your mind still and not racing ahead to future happenings, or ruminating on past occurrences? New research indicates numerous benefits of mindfulness for school aged children: better sleep habits, boosting concentration, and reducing stress and anxiety. It can even have a flow on effect of lowering disruptive and bullying behaviour in schools. In the Junior School weekly Mindfulness sessions lasting 5-10 minutes are provided on Wednesday mornings at 8.30 in the Activity Centre. It has been great to see students, their parents and staff members start their days by having a time of being mindful. Additionally, mindfulness is used in several classrooms with teachers reporting benefits of greater concentration and increased output from students. One teacher mentioned that doing a 5-10 minute mindfulness activity with their class means the class then completes 45 minutes worth of a learning task in 30 minutes. If you're interested in mindfulness the Smiling Mind app is a good place to start, and all members of the community are welcome to join the Wednesday morning mindfulness session in the Activity Centre.




