YEAR 4 EXCURSION

As part of our HASS unit this term, the Year 4s will be developing an understanding on the nature of contact between Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people and European settlers, and the effects of these interactions on Indigenous people.

We started our unit with students working together to create a visual representation on how long Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people, and European settlers have lived in Australia.

The end result was a very long paper chain and an effective impression that Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people have been in Australia for a much longer time than we have!



We then visited the Living Kaurna Cultural Centre on Thursday 27 July, where our guide, Tameroo, explained the significance of this place and generously shared with us some of his knowledge on the Kaurna people.

Tameroo explained that the site of the Living Kaurna Cultural Centre is now known as Warriparinga, which means Windy Place by the River and is a Kaurna ceremonial meeting place and European early settlement site.

The Living Kaurna Cultural Centre was built to ensure that the Kaurna culture and the Dreaming Story of the Land, is passed on from generation to generation.





A student summed up what we all felt by the end of our excursion when he shared, "It felt like going into a different world." Although both classes were caught in the rain during our tour, we learnt so much about the Kaurna people while also taking in the beautiful grounds of the centre.

Among the highlights of our trip were looking at the Dreamtime mural under the bridge and learning to read the stories they were telling, learning about how the Kaurna people made their shields, visiting a Kaurna 'lolly shop', 'supermarket' and a 'baby hospital'.

"How do the Kaurna people use an emu as a cooking thermometer?", "What does the Kaurna version of Google look like?", "How do the Kaurna people choose which berries to eat?", "Why are the mens' camp ovens bigger than the womens?" and "What is one thing that the Kaurna people do to their naughty children?", were just some of the traditional knowledge that Tameroo shared with us. Needless to say, students, parents and teachers were left fascinated and amazed by the culture of the Kaurna people.

By the end of our visit we had all deepened our 'natalia' (which Tameroo taught us is the Kaurna word for respect) for the knowledge and skills of the Kaurna people, something important to hold on to as active citizens.

NOTES ON WELLBEING

CAN YOU FLOURISH MORE CONSISTENTLY?

Do you have a mood strategy? What are your strengths? Can you use your strengths intelligently? Can you make connections a priority? Can you keep your passion harmonious? Can you be grittier?

The questions are not only relevant to adults, but also to the younger generation. These questions were presented to delegates at the recent ACLE5 conference by Michelle McQuaid who refers to herself as a 'change activator'.

Her presentation concentrated on the elements of wellbeing as defined by the PERMA acronym. With what can we equip ourselves and our children so that flourishing happens more consistently?

PERMA captures the elements of wellbeing that contribute towards a flourishing life:

- Positive emotion the presence of heartfelt positivity
- Engagement the development of our strengths
- Relationships the opportunity for genuine connection
- Meaning the chance to make a positive difference
- Accomplishment the ability to achieve the things that matter

Add to this healthy eating, exercise and good sleep (sometime referred to as '+').

Life throws a lot at us and it is easy to be overwhelmed, stressed and anxious. Children of today have pressures that did not exist when their parents were children (e.g. social media). Forward projections predict mental health to be a far greater concern in years to come.

It is vitally important to equip ourselves and our children with a 'toolbox' to proactively focus on wellbeing, so that we may be more likely to flourish instead of flounder.

A challenge for educators is to intentionally embed positive education practices in the learning program so students will become more resilient and grow.

So look again at the questions in the first paragraph.

Do you have an answer for them?

What can you do?

A good starting point is intention. By intentionally focussing on positive practices wellbeing can grow.

CELEBRATING RESEARCH PROJECT RESULTS!

The majority of Year 12 students at Tatachilla undertake the Research Project in Year 12. As you may know, particularly if you are a parent of the current Year 12s, the successful completion of this compulsory 10 credit subject is required in order that students can achieve their Stage 2 SACE. This subject is timetabled in Semester 1 and needs to be completed according to SACE deadlines ready for moderation and marking by external experts in the subject.

Ms Louise Catt and the team of Research Project teachers for 2017 work closely with each other to ensure that there is consistency applied to marking standards for the Research Project before student work is submitted for external moderation and marking. This provides a great opportunity for the team to work collaboratively to ensure all students' work is read and discussed regarding the marking standards applied.

There are two versions of the Research Project offered – Research Project A and B. From 2017, each of these options offers the opportunity for students to become eligible for an ATAR and university entrance. There are three components to the subject: Folio, Outcome and Evaluation. All three components of the course are moderated by the teaching team for in excess of one hundred students this year before they are packaged and sent to SACE.

On August 1, SACE released the results for this subject. I am thrilled to report that the achievement for the cohort was excellent. 27% of students resulted achieved grades within the A band; 49% achieved results within the B band and 24% achieved a satisfactory result. Furthermore, two of our Year 12 students were resulted as A+.

These promising results are testament to the hard work of the teachers and students and bode well for the individual subject results at the end of the year.

Students are reminded that they have access to their SACE results via their individual login details that were provided at the beginning of the academic year. This facility will become particularly important when remaining results are released in December.

If students have forgotten or misplaced this information, they are encouraged to speak with Mrs Cheryl Simes or Dr Michelle Coop.

NEW SCIENCE SUBJECT FOR YEAR 12 STUDENTS IN 2018: NUTRITION

From the beginning of 2018, the Science faculty will be offering a Stage 2 (Year 12) Nutrition course. Within this course, students will learn about the fundamentals of human nutrition, investigate the role of nutrients in the body and explore the links between health and diet-related disease. They will also consider and investigate issues associated with global food production, wastage, sustainability and famine.

The course will be assessed in a very similar format to the other Science subjects currently on offer through practical reports, investigative assignment/s and skills and application tasks including written tests.


We are excited about the opportunity this brings to our students as this subject promises to teach and reinforce the important role of diet and lifestyle habits to maximise health outcomes.

The weather drove us indoors, but it was truly amazing to see students across R-12 participate in a variety of challenges and have fun together. A highlight was the 'all-in' Just Dance that took over the gym, with students from every sub-school dancing together with sheer joy.

The best part of the day was when the Orange Sky van drove onto our oval, and we had the opportunity to see inside the van and speak with volunteers who support our friends on the street to stay clean and feel valued. At the final Assembly for the term, one of the volunteers from Orange Sky was able to address the audience and speak specifically about the origins of Orange Sky, and how the service has grown from just one van to 11, spread across Australia. Orange Sky have now extended some of their service vans to also supplying showers for those living on the streets.

Thank you to everyone who supported Challenge for Charity this year, from making sweet treats, running activities, coordinating challenges, supporting the activities and donating funds. A special thank you to the coordinating team, headed by our Youth Worker Courtney Blake.




