CAMBODIA 2017

Well what an experience! The MATES 2017 experience in Cambodia has come and gone and left heads spinning, hearts racing and lives expanded around Tatachilla Lutheran College!

MATES was an acronym arrived at by the students before ordering their T-shirts for this Service Learning experience. It stands for mission, awareness, transformation, encounter/enlightenment and service. It particularly grasps the notion that at the heart of the trip is the desire to build relationships with the people of Krux Village. The Aussie notion of mateship and solidarity started as an aspiration but became reality for our students.

So what did 'mission' come to mean for us?

We were on mission to become aware of the horrific toll on life and society generally under Pol Pot as we quietly walked through the Killing Fields Museum and the S21 Detention Centre. We were on a mission to encounter and be enlightened by learning from those striving to close orphanages because of abusive practises in them, and then place children back into their own families.

In Krux village we were transformed from tourists to be 'part of the family' by playing with the locals, helping children learn English, going on a picnic with the staff and providing the funds to see four modest houses built. Here it was not so much swinging hammers that served but by identifying the needs and supporting the dreams and hopes of this little community to make a loving impact on some of the weakest and frail members of the village. It was their vision we served.

We were transformed from individualist, self-sufficient, westerners to humbled, self-aware, limited beings in the presence of a little girl dying from cancer. We served and were 'on mission' as we stood there in solidarity expressing love in our own helplessness -some praying for the first time for grace to be at work in that situation. We were on a mission to listen and learn whilst sitting at the feet of Guntha, a Khmer Rouge Survivor, as she shared with us her tale of courage and second chances. She was transformed from a corpse after being left for dead in a mass grave. Transformation was epitomised in her testimony of placing her faith in a man, who two thousand years earlier, had risen from the dead and loved the lost and how that had inspired her to overcome and be transformed.

We were on mission to encounter and be enlightened as 13 and 14 year olds patiently taught us to speak some Khmer at a Transform Learning Centre sponsored by SA's own Molly Dooker Winery. We were 'on mission' when we were buying tickets to Phare Circus or buying cup-cakes and drinks in Blooms Café knowing that every cent we spent there went to support the very waitresses serving us who had been rescued out of trafficked sex-slave entrapment.

We were also on mission to encounter ancient civilisation and inspiring nature as we rode bikes through the famous Ankor Temples. We served by sharing, watching, learning, and by showing solidarity with our new found brothers and sisters.

Next year's group is already forming and will meet with Pastor Sophouen from Krux Village in December when she comes back to study here. We pray that the next visit to our mates in Cambodia will continue to build on our relationship and be of ongoing mutual support for all involved.

MINDFULNESS TRIAL UPDATE

Tatachilla has now participated in Flinders University's Wellbeing research for over three years, conducted by Catherine Johnson during her Psychology PhD. This series of studies investigated mindfulness as a preventative mental health strategy for a range of problems that commonly emerge in adolescence (anxiety, depression and eating disorders), and the results have been presented at Oxford University as well as published in four peer-reviewed journals.

The first trial developed a measure of mindfulness for use with adolescents. A subsequent large trial over four schools (863 students) tested a popular 8 week mindfulness program from the UK with Year 8 students, but although students reported enjoying the program there were no lasting measurable benefits.

This year's study tested whether a more intensive program with more meditation during lessons, and more opportunity for discussion, would be more effective. This also compared Year 8 and 10 students to see whether older students might show more benefit.

Preliminary results from this small pilot sample suggest a benefit for depression that was equally strong in Year 8 and Year 10 students.

Although harder to fit into the timetable, Year 10 students showed an additional benefit in some really helpful elements of mindfulness (eg, the ability to step back from unhelpful thoughts) that we know predict better mental health over the long term.

Tatachilla looks forward to continuing cutting-edge Wellbeing research in partnership with Flinders University.


