At this point in the longest term of the academic year, pressures of summative assessment can mount for students, especially if organisation is not made a priority. It is impossible for students to sustain a consistent standard across their subject areas in a stress free way if they are constantly moving from one deadline emergency to another. Similarly, test preparation can suffer if students are meeting assignment deadlines at the last minute. Senior School students should not be working on a single task to the exclusion of all other course work. If assessment results do not reflect a student's ability, very often planning and organisation can be key factors in the result.

Students and parents/caregivers are encouraged to take advantage of the resources available on the student study site for Elevate Education that includes support for organisation tips as well as a guide to constructing a study timetable. With examinations approximately 11 school weeks away for the Years 10 and 11 students, forward planning to accommodate study and coursework completion is vital to success. YEAR 10 FOCUS

Year 10 students have a great deal to look forward to this semester. We've already had a positive start to the year in getting to know the newest members of our sub-school community. The introductory interviews held with each student have enabled us to learn about them as individuals and to begin early discussions about dreams and goals for their futures. This new initiative is linked to the SACE compulsory subject, The Personal Learning Plan, and offers students an opportunity to experience the interview process in a supported and relaxed environment while sharing their aspirations. Staff involved thoroughly enjoyed the experience and were impressed with the openness of the students.

Students also appreciated the opportunity to discuss themselves and their futures with their Home Class Teachers. One student commented that, "Walking away from the interview I felt changed. For the first time, I felt like I could achieve anything I wanted. The first thing I did once I walked out the interview room was to book in to see Mrs Templeman. I really wanted to make sure I took in what the teachers said and take advantage of the fact I can get someone to help me plan my future. I really feel that this interview helped me work out how to plan my time more and to work effectively. I now feel ready for the rest of my schooling years."

This semester Year 10 students can also look forward to ABW, Work Experience and Mock Job Interviews.

Australian Business Week (ABW) gives Year 10 student participants a greater understanding of the world of business as they take over and run their own simulated company, making all of the management decisions necessary for the successful operation of their business in a competitive marketplace. Working in teams, they make decisions that have real outcomes as they deal with the full complexity of business activity. Participants develop an understanding of finance and business strategy, marketing, operations and managing the broad range of business resources - especially their human resources.

Team Mentors are people on loan from business and education who play a key role in modelling the philosophy of ABW. Mentors enable young people to learn about business through assisting them to run their own simulated company. The students' understanding of business is ideally facilitated through the support of both a teacher and Team Mentor for each team.

In 2018, there will be 10 teams of students undertaking ABW and we would greatly value any contribution that you could make to the program. R-12

ELECTRONIC REPORTING

This year the College will be introducing electronic reporting for all students from Reception to Year 12. This means that student reports will no longer be printed but will be available online through SEQTA: Engage. This will be undertaken for several reasons:

- Environmental sustainability: the College is a proud advocate of sustainable practices and producing electronic reports reduces the carbon footprint we leave on the Earth.
- Extending assessment periods: as reports no longer need to be printed and packaged, this reduces the amount of time that we require to lead into the publication of reports. This allows for greater opportunity to ensure reports have the most recent and current information included.
- Ease of access: the electronic report remains on SEQTA: Engage for the time that your child is enrolled at the College. You can save or print your own copy from SEQTA: Engage at any point of their educational journey to retain forever.

 Delivery: students will no longer need to collect and deliver their reports home, therefore removing any opportunity that these are left behind at school or in lockers.

To access a copy of your child's report you will need to be able to access SEQTA: Engage. On Monday 12 March 2018, parent/caregivers who have not created a log-on for SEQTA: Engage will receive an email with a link to create their own unique username and password. This link is valid for 1 week.

We thank you for your support as we transition to electronic reporting and encourage you to make contact with the College should you have questions.

STARTING WITH A POSITIVE

You might have a daily ritual in your home where you ask your teenager how their day was. We probably have caught ourselves asking the magic question 'What did you do today?' and probably get the answer 'I can't remember.' At times we might stop asking questions or choose another time to ask the very same question.

Starting with a positive is the key to enabling teenagers to reflect on their day with you as a parent. Questions or conversation starters such as;

- What was the best thing that happened at school today?
- Tell me something that made you laugh today.
- If I called your teacher tonight what would she/he tell me about you?
- How did you help somebody today?
- Tell me one thing that you learnt today.
- What was your favourite part of recess or lunch today?
- Tell me about three different times you used technology today at school.
- What word did your teacher say most today?

We encourage parents to never stop asking questions of their teenagers and start conversations with a positive in mind. The Student Planner also has ways for parents to reflect positively with your teenager on their learning and wellbeing in the weekly section of the planner.

We encourage you to check the weekly section once a week or more to engage in dialogue with your teenager about their strengths, learning goals and actions, what has worked well in their week and help them prioritise assignments and home learning tasks.

We keep our student leaders in our prayers, that they are attentive to the voices of students in the Middle School and make a positive difference in their service to others.





SPORTS DAY




> I have been teaching at St Michael's Lutheran Primary School in Hahndorf. I taught there for 11 years.

WELCOME TO OUR NEW MIDDLE SCHOOL STEM FACILITY WHERE YOUNG PEOPLE CREATE, MAKE AND INNOVATE.



If I was a guest visiting the Middle School STEM area what would I see students doing?

Students will work in a variety of contexts including whole class and small group instructional and project based learning to create meaningful connections in learning. Students will utilise flexible furniture which can be relocated, used outdoors or rearranged to suit the learning at the time.

How would students be using digital technologies and equipment to design, innovate and create?

Cross-curricular and interdisciplinary learning allows students to use new technology such as 3D printers to design, print and construct items through skills developed in Digital Technologies. The items can then measure, record and analyse results utilising skills learnt in Science and Mathematics.

How might what they do in the new building differ to what they're able to do now?

Students will undertake the new digital and design technologies curriculum, focussing on the 'design, make and appraise' process which can be applied in other subject areas. Collaborative teacher planning will enable students to conceptually learn in deeper ways with students sharing their learning through exhibitions to parents, peers and staff.


