Over the last week in the life of a Year 9 Middle School student, a transformational experience occurred for each of our young women and men through the

Specialness Exhibition. This exhibition, being an end to a six-month long journey in challenging themselves to find their passion and serve others through exploring their vocation.







Reflection on this event caused me to make connections to an educational researcher and innovator who we are fortunate enough to be working with through the Independent Schools Association, Mr Charles Leadbeater.

Charles writes that the core purpose of education needs to shift from teaching students to follow instructions to identify and solve problems. Charles explains that this has been at the core of mass education and driven its success. However, in a more volatile, uncertain world, characterised by innovation and entrepreneurship, we now need to equip young people to solve problems of all shapes and sizes. Problems that will not come with instructions.

Charles says that to make this shift, education systems need to provide dynamic experiences for young people where they can learn to practice how to deploy knowledge into action, to work with others and to develop critical personal strengths such as persistence and resilience, to learn from feedback and overcome setbacks. The Specialness Project is one of these dynamic experiences that challenges our young people to create and innovate through pursuing their passions, learning new skills from mentors and making an impact on other's lives through this process.

We are so proud of our Year 9 students in the way they have embraced the challenges of the Specialness Project. Each project is unique and has captured the voice, heart and talents of each student. Through the Specialness Project Exhibition our young people shared their story behind their project with their parents, mentors and staff. It was so wonderful to receive such encouraging parent feedback after the exhibition.

Mitchell's Specialness Project: A Mum's Journey

When we received the details, I knew this project could be an amazing learning opportunity for Mitch. What I couldn't predict was the extent of that learning – or that I myself would learn so much.

Mitch has an incredible imagination and is very creative, something usually expressed through drama, technology or writing. He decided he'd like to make something old into something that once again has purpose by using hand tools. As our family enjoys cycling, Mitch thought it would be fun to restore an old bike. For the act of service component he chose mental health as the focus, as cycling promotes positive mental health in a number of ways. He would give the bike to someone who experiences mental health challenges and for whom owning a bike would make a positive difference.

A friend of ours, Grant Warren, restores bikes as a hobby and was happy to mentor Mitch. Under his guidance I watched my son transform a rusty, 40 year old bike into a work of art. Throughout the hours of hard work and the late nights, he did not complain once.

Through my work in mental health we were able to connect with a refugee who has experienced trauma. Hadi had been hoping to get a bike which would allow him to connect with others socially and potentially access employment or



study. Mitch is thrilled he can help Hadi with this.

Besides the obvious learning such as practical skills and knowledge of tools and bikes, I saw Mitch's confidence sky rocket. He was forced to step outside his comfort zone and sit with discomfort rather than run away from it. He developed better listening and communication skills, and organisational skills (I am hoping this is a permanent thing).

As his proud Mum, I've had my own learning journey. Two things stand out: Steve and I can be assured we are raising a young man with a kind and compassionate heart. And when allowed the dignity of risk to try new things, make mistakes and try again, Mitch's potential is limitless.

VOLUNTARY BUILDING FUND

BUS SERVICES

Tatachilla buses are fitted with the BusMinder System. The BusMinder Parent App can be downloaded from the Apple App Store or Google Play. After downloading the app and signingin, parents can make payment, receive notifications, as well as seeing live GPS data of the active bus runs.

Bookings for all bus travel is essential and must be done prior to payment or travel. Students travelling on the bus services must have a registered student ID card or Keyfob to tap on & off the BusMinder system.

It is a condition of travel that Bus Fees are paid in advance of travel. Parents are reminded to regularly login to their BusMinder Parent Account and check their current balance to ensure sufficient funds are available. Payment of bus travel is to be made through the BusMinder Parent App or by phoning the College Office on 8323 9588.

Students wanting to travel on alternative bus services for sporting or work commitments or wishing to have a 'friend' travel with them must seek approval prior to travel as this may not always be possible due to availability. Additional cost may apply.

CURRICULUM MATTERS

WHY CAN'T WE TEACH LIKE WE USED TO?

Many of us experienced school as a place where we all sat in rows at our own desk and learning comprised of trying to absorb all the wisdom and facts our teachers shared with us in order to obtain high scores and gain the best job we could after school. Education has changed dramatically in the past decade, and at a rapidly increasing rate. Two of the most eminent and well respected contemporary educational researchers explain this beautifully: Sir John Jones (knighted for services to education in the UK) and Sir Ken Robinson (author, researcher and international speaker on creative and cultural education in the UK, Europe, Asia and the United States and the most watched speaker in TED Talk's history).

Sir John Jones explains how preparing our children for a world that doesn't yet exist has its challenges and responsibilities for educators – one that we can't ignore but must in fact embrace. He writes that, "We live in a rapidly changing world. A world in which statisticians claim, 80% of the jobs our children will do have not yet been invented. ... We are all going to need five key capabilities; creativity, ingenuity, agility, adaptability and sociability. This has huge implications for schooling, in general, and teachers, in particular... Schools are going to need to develop learning environments which, while encouraging the relentless pursuit of excellence, also seek to promote a culture which questions the status quo and invites staff to take risks and embrace change." While the measure of our industrial education was how much we knew for each subject, Sir John Jones makes no mention of knowledge as a goal, but rather what we can do with it - creatively, ingeniously, with agility, adaptability and socially.

Sir Ken Robinson defines the purpose of education as 'enabling students to understand the world around them and the talents within them so that they can become fulfilled individuals and active, compassionate citizens.' He focusses on the radical changes that are needed in education for our students to thrive. He notes, "There are forthcoming challenges in the 21st century - climate change, ethics around artificial intelligence, and more - and people need to be working closely in communities, using their full set of talents, in order to solve them... education instructors of today play a key role in shaping the future." He highlights too the importance of letting students learn from their mistakes (as that is ultimately the point where new learning occurs), and the emphasis we should be taking when talking with and encouraging our students, "I have come to a realisation that effort and hard work should be praised more than being smart; that learning how to handle failure is a key life skill; that all of us possess that inner spark and finding your genius is more important than being a genius..."

As John Dewey, another eminent educational reformer famously said, "if we teach children today as we taught them yesterday, we will deprive them of their tomorrow." As teachers, we continue to learn and grow.

This year's SleepWalkin' starts at 3.30pm on Friday 7 June (end of Week 6), and finishes at 7am on Saturday 8 June.

On the night, guest speakers from Vinnies tell us about their work supporting members of our community who find themselves experiencing homelessness, and the major issues facing them. Attending students form themselves into groups of eight and walk laps of the oval in shifts for 12 hours (6pm – 6am). Breaks are able to be taken, but during those breaks students sleep or rest on the floor of the gym foyer.





We have had a great start to Term 2 here at Camp Australia,


