YEAR 9 EMERGING PATHWAYS

Our Year 9s have been focussing on their emerging pathway over the last few months to support them in choosing their subjects for Year 10. These choices will largely influence how they complete their SACE over the next couple of years and for some, will shape their early professional life as well.

During Term 2, students were asked to share the jobs that they were interested in and, from that data, partnerships were formed with members of our community from Engineers, Police Detectives, Strength and Conditioning Coaches, Veterinarians, Chefs, Journalists and Nurses. Very graciously, Old Scholars, parents and local professionals gave up their time to talk to our students about the highs and lows of their professional life, which gave our students a valuable insight into their potential career pathways. Thank you to Charlotte Matthews, Zoe Kassiotis, Poppy Fitzpatrick, Robyn Gilligan, Mel Wood, Karen Armstrong, Jordan Pritchard, Brooke Hastler, Greg Thompson and Shenae Sketchley for sharing their expertise.

During Week 1 of this term Year 9s enjoyed a variety of activities to prepare them for Senior School.

On the Wednesday students got to "taste" the electives on offer at the Yr 10 Taster Day. Students were given a 90-minute exposure of theory and practical components of these courses.

On the Thursday, 21 students attended the Naval Shipbuilding College at the Regency TAFE and on the Friday all Year 9 classes visited Flinders University where they immersed themselves in four electives from a stream of university studies: Business, Government and Law; Education, Psychology and Social Work; Science and Engineering; Humanities, Arts and Social Sciences; Medicine and Public Health, Nursing and Health Sciences; and VET and Industry.

All these experiences have, in some way, shaped the current and future reality of our students. For some, it has led to a confirmation that a particular pathway is a right fit for them, whereas, learning that this is not actually what I want to do with my life is just as an important reason for having undergone these experiences.

NAVAL SHIPBUILDING COLLEGE - TAFE SA

As part of our commitment to provide future pathways for students at Tatachilla, a group of 21 Year 9 students participated in an excursion to Recency Park TAFE to explore the Naval Shipbuilding College.

Our host, Amanda Phillis, Coordinator of the Advanced Welder Training Centre, welcomed students to the TAFE campus.

Students had an opportunity to view a presentation about Defence Industries, the Shipbuilding Cycle, future job opportunities and the role of the Naval Shipbuilding College. A discussion regarding what students knew about the Defence/Shipbuilding industry and jobs for the future sparked enthusiasm among some students.

Defence Industries Principal Lecturer, Dean Lawrence spoke briefly about apprenticeships in the Naval Shipbuilding College and the future possibilities for our students.

Students and teachers then moved onto the 'Advanced Welder Training Centre' where they were introduced to 21st Century technology - Virtual Reality Welding Simulators. Students watched a brief demonstration and had the privilege to participate in some VR welding practice. Participants were scored out of 100 for their specific welding technique, with some students managing to reach scores in the 90s. The Training Centre simulators proved to be popular with students and teachers alike.

After a well-deserved lunch break, students were given an extensive tour of the numerous fabrication and welding workshops as well as the CAD and 3D printing suites and informed of the role they play in various apprenticeship opportunities. Q&A opportunities were provided throughout this tour and some students were keen to find out more.

Overall, the day was an eye-opener for some students and clarification for others. It provided an insight into various pathways which students can start through the Design and Technology and STEM subjects at Tatachilla Lutheran College.

Yesterday, Miss Stephanie Harvie, Year 1 teacher, sent me some photographs of her class playing in The Creek. They were clambering up the lower branches of the old gum tree aka 'The Climbing Tree'. Other children were photographed resting above the creek on a bridge they had made of sticks and planks. Another few are swinging

on the rope in the old olive tree. Miss Harvie captioned the photographs, "A regular day at TLC."

It was this time four years ago, 'The Creek' opened as a new play space. We had the trees checked by an arborist to ensure they were stable and safe, a hive of bees had to be moved on, and we set the existing old bridge as the easternmost boundary. And that was about it. At the same time, stick play was also introduced to the Junior School. Not everyone was convinced that giving children sticks to play with was a good idea. However, since then, The Creek has become a very popular lunchtime destination and stick play is well-established in our play culture. Despite the initial nervousness and concerns about safety, we find there are very few incidences of unexpected behaviour or B choices when children are involved in this form of play. Typically they are fully immersed in what they are doing and take pride in the bases and cubbies they have built.

Part of the success of these play initiatives is the stick rules - three concepts that are practical and simple enough for everyone to remember and follow:

- Sticks are for building
- Sticks are dragged, not carried
- Sticks belong to nature

Additionally, all play, whether in The Creek, on the oval or one of our playgrounds, is guided by TLC Cares – we cooperate with each other; enjoy a sense of achievement; we respect and encourage each other, and we make safe choices.

In the Junior School, we believe that play is learning and feel very grateful that the unique grounds we enjoy makes it easy for our children to have these wonderful playtimes every day.

CURRICULUM MATTERS

TEACHING AND LEARNING IS INNOVATIVE, PERSONALISED AND CHALLENGING

Innovation is one of the most exciting and challenging aspects of teaching and learning, and essential for equipping our students for exponential change and technological developments in their world. It is equally challenging for teaching communities as we explore and grapple with new ways of being, teaching and learning, and families managing these innovations in recreational contexts.

TEACHER LEARNING: APPLE AUSTRALIA LEARNING LEADERS

Last week, Junior School teachers Miss Stephanie Harvie and Mrs Suzanne Vile achieved the honour of being Apple Learning Leaders and are amongst the first cohort invited to do so by Apple Australia. Apple Learning Institute is a multi-day professional learning experience delivered by Apple Professional Learning Specialists and focuses on the features of iOS devices, Apple apps, and Apple resources for learning and teaching. Stephanie and Suzanne are now acknowledged leaders in developing foundational and integration level skills for educators and will provide invaluable expertise in further developing our professional learning community, resources that support our College's priorities and student learning.



Core learning innovations that Stephanie and Suzanne can now support our community with include:

- ensuring educators understand the qualities and behaviours of learning and teaching excellence
- expanding personal skills in iOS and Apple apps
- enhancing awareness and usage of Apple program resources for professional learning
- creating professional learning implementation plans for the College
- developing professional learning communities with a focus on technology
- understanding how Apple technology and resources can support College priorities

STUDENT LEARNING: DIGITAL TECHNOLOGIES

These are just some of the key understandings students have been pursuing:

- The importance of verbal and non-verbal positional language outside of coding in order to respond to and create accurate coded sequences of steps eg. what are the most important positional pictures, numbers, words and actions that young students need to understand for sequenced instructions? (Reception)
- The concept of positions and positional language, digital protocols for using positional language with avatars in gaming, and considering which 3D views are most beneficial to the player – birdseye, sideview or front-on when constructing a 'game interface.' (Year 1)
- Collecting, collating, analysing and digitally representing data about birds at Tatachilla and the impact of the local environment on them, using EcoClassroom facilities. (Year 4)
- The importance of digital technology specific language and students understanding of what terms such as 'function', 'menu', and ellipses icons mean in a digital context. (Year 2)

FAMILY LEARNING: BALANCING SCREEN TIME WITH GREEN TIME

Establishing positive and productive habits for all aspects of being an iPad user is essential. iPads in the Junior School are focussed on assisting students with 'a sound ICT capability in order to appropriately access, create and communicate information and ideas, solve problems and work collaboratively in all learning areas at school, and in their lives beyond school as ethical digital citizens. While most students develop positive digital citizenship behaviours and habits quite easily, some students prefer to test the boundaries' (Student ICT Agreement). For these students, one strategy that can be particularly helpful is ensuring that screen time is balanced by 'green time.' In other words, the amount of time spent on screens should not be greater than the total time children spend outside in nature, technology free. An hour outside playing in the backyard could therefore enable an hour of screen-based piece of technology.

NT SERVICE TRIP

The annual Ampilatwatja Service Trip greeted us on a rather drizzly Adelaide morning, although the 2019 Service Team weren't chilly for too much longer; after embarking on a two-week trip around remote Central Australia. The team began the trip by visiting Uluru and Kata Tjuta; sacred and cultural sites to the Anangu People. We were privileged to have Park Ranger Alex show us around some of the sacred sites and explain to us both the Indigenous Bush Food and Dreaming in these places. There is a rich sense of connection that can only be experienced when you travel to these places in person and we were humbled and awed by our time there.

The team then headed out to Ampilatwatia, a remote Indigenous community approximately 300km North East of Alice Springs. There we spent 7 days immersed in the local community participating in relational and practical service. For the first time ever, people from the Ampilatwatja community were waiting to greet us on our arrival; excitement and anticipation from both mobs! During our time in Ampilatwatja we witnessed artwork being hand-painted; sung at the Sunday church service; visited the Health Centre, Art Centre, General Store and Rec Centre; spent time learning Alyawarr Language; watched individual men's and women's customs and skills being shared; and were invited to join the wider community in a meal of Kangaroo tail and potatoes. The relationship between Tatachilla and the Lutheran Church in Ampilatwatja continues to grow strong, and there is a real sense that we are part of a continuing, living, breathing story!
