This week I was fortunate to be able to gather with colleagues in Hobart for our National Lutheran Principal's Conference. Getting to and from Hobart required two flights, via Melbourne. Travelling back on Wednesday night we were flying just on dusk. I was conscious when we were beyond the clouds at 30,000 feet, just missing the arrival of the Antarctic blast that had been spoken about for the previous 24 hours, that I was – Up! Once we have risen above the clouds on a flight, can we still dream of looking up? Will we ever attain an even higher altitude?

The College theme this year, taken from 2 Corinthians, sets a striking provocation enabling deep reflection, hope, determination and perspective. At the end of Term 1, our whole College community came together for an aerial photo to gather around this theme – Look Up. Look Beyond.

Under careful instruction students from Reception through to Year 12 gathered on the Junior School, assembled in either the letters of the theme or as one of the grapes in our Seek Fresh Horizons symbol.

The theme not only challenges us to look up but to also look beyond.

Courtney Blake, Youth Worker, shared at Chapel at the end of Term 1,

“Perhaps ‘Looking Beyond’ isn’t about outward striving; striving for wealth, possessions, reputation, fame, philanthropy or future, but is rather, an opportunity to reconnect with our core-self. A connection of our shared humanity and a deeper understanding of the individual strengths and characteristics that we can offer the world around us. It is a theme that dares us to expand our understanding of what we know to be real, to embrace growth; an anthem of hope, a declaration and acceptance of self.”

As we move deeper into Term 2, may we as student, parent, caregiver and staff member, each consider the possibilities of what lie beyond the horizon, beyond even the highest clouds, of what the possibilities are for our future. A vision worth dreaming is one worth attaining to. As you come to realise what the possibilities may be for you individually this term, I pray that you will be strengthened, supported, challenged and encouraged through our community to hope large, dream big, think deep, reflect wide and love eternally.

YEAR 3 AND 5 NAPLAN TESTING - MAY 15, 16 & 17

These tests will take place on 15-17 May, with catch-up tests for absent students scheduled for Friday 18 May.

The results provide valuable data about the performance of individual students and will be reported to parents/ caregivers. The College will also receive data that allows us to compare the performance of the year level against national standards and help us to monitor the longitudinal attainment of students as they move through the College.

This assessment will take place in your child's home classroom. Students must be at their classroom promptly at 8:40am to be seated in time for the start of the tests.

MINDFUL OR MIND FULL?

Much has been made in the media over recent months about practicing mindfulness. Newsagents have vast selections of mindful colouring books and social media has no end of helpful hints on how to lead a more mindful life. Whilst the benefits are proven, it can be difficult to know where to start, particularly if you would like to help your children to be more mindful.

To dispel a common myth, mindfulness is not about trying to relax or to achieve any particular outcome. It is more about 'paying attention in a particular way; on purpose, in the present moment and non-judgmentally' (Jon Kabat-Zinn). In our busy lives where we quickly change between tasks and try to focus on so many different stimuli, our minds can often feel very full. Practicing mindfulness can allow your mind and body to simply just 'be'; to enjoy the walk in the park, feeling the sun on your face without distraction.

Mindfulness is an excellent way to provide children with experiences that can enhance their emotional intelligence including self-regulation, impulse control, understanding and controlling their own emotions and becoming more self-aware. As part of our Wellbeing program, many of our students are practicing mindfulness in their classrooms, with the Year 3 classes undertaking a focussed program led by their teachers and Emma Thompson. CREATING TRANSFORMATIONAL LEARNING EXPERIENCES IN THE MIDDLE YEARS

Our hearts and minds were moved Wednesday afternoon in Week 2 as we celebrated the talents, gifts and vocations of our Year 9s at the Specialness Project Display. Throughout the year, Year 9 students have been exploring what deeply matters to them and how they can use their talents, strengths and beliefs they have with purpose and service to others. We have been exploring how this becomes the vocation they have within their lives.

Parents and special friends were invited to come and share in the students' presentations as they answered questions based around their project, process and how a sense of vocation could be seen in their project.

We were immensely proud of the way our young people communicated their passions, what deeply matters to them and how they can be a service to others. We thank all the parents, grandparents, relatives and friends who joined us in this celebration and to every parent and mentor who help shaped their teenager's project and embraced the transformational learning experience that the Specialness Project provides to our young people's development and pathway into the senior years of their schooling.



YEAR 7 STEM PROJECT – BRING BACK THE BANDICOOTS

We are blessed to have one beautiful landscape and environment at Tatachilla where our students in the middle years learn about earth care and sustainability for the future. Our teachers in Maths, Science, Design, Digital Technology and EcoClassroom collaborate together to help grow our students' understanding of what it means to be a global citizen and how meaningful action in local ways can have a global impact.

Our Year 7s are immersed in a real world of conservation management in our EcoClassroom STEM project - Bring Back the Bandicoots. Students will create a proposal to present to the NRM Board in how they can rejuvenate the eco-systems to bring back the Bandicoots to our EcoClassroom. They will utilise their mathematical and scientific thinking to create ways to do this and utilise 3D printing of their models for their proposal.

We were delighted to hear from the NRM Board this week about the role they play in conservation management and climate change. Here students were able to engage with real work partnerships with industry, government and councils. Our hope is that they can transfer their knowledge, understanding and skills across more than just one learning area and that they find their real voice and action in real life learning experiences.

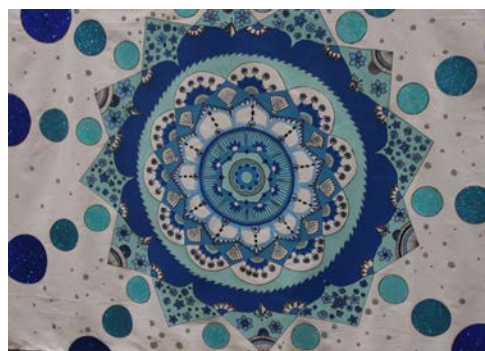
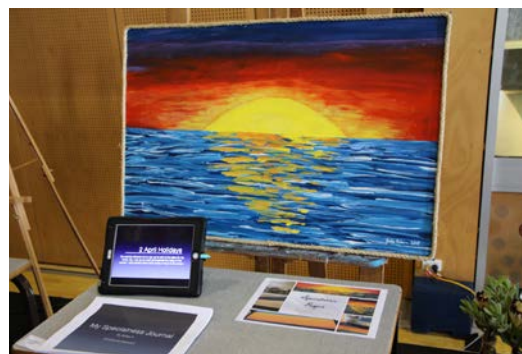
PARENT TEACHER INTERVIEWS

JAPAN TOUR

On 7 April, 21 students and 5 staff set off for a 2 week trip of a lifetime to Japan. With our bags fully packed and stuffed with Australian souvenirs for our friends at our sister school, Toryo High School, we had our last photo opportunity outside the Adelaide Airport International departure gates, said goodbye to our family members and then we were off!

Our first stop was Singapore Airport, and with a long stopover, we had plenty of time to explore all the options available. From movie cinemas, massage chairs and shopping opportunities, we all tried not to spend all of our money before we reached Japan.

We arrived in Osaka mid-morning, and headed straight for Kyoto, the cultural capital of Japan and our home for the next two nights. Immediately, the amazing culture and scenery of Japan was there to see, as we visited the Golden Kinkakuji Temple, Kyomizudera (Water Temple) and experienced a very traditional Japanese dance (Miyako Odori). Our accommodation, traditional Japanese rooms with Japanese "Tatami" matted floors and futons for sleeping, on only added to the experience.

We boarded the bullet train for the first time, and after a night completing final preparations, we headed for Toryo High School, our homestay for the next five days. We briefly toured Kumamoto area, and were welcomed to Toryo with individual signs, a memory and welcome simply impossible to forget!! Over the next two days at Toryo we would enjoy a welcome ceremony, Japanese tea ceremonies, calligraphy lessons, flower arranging, origami, sports clubs and much more. Above all, each Tatachilla student enjoyed amazing hospitality and kindness from our Toryo friends and their homestay families and it is something we will always be grateful for. Tears were flowing as we departed Toryo on Monday morning, with many promises to keep in touch.

Our second week was incredibly busy. After our next bullet train ride (and a quick opportunity to catch up on sleep) we arrived in Okayama, our base for the next three nights. During this time, we saw Hiroshima Peace Park/Museum and Miyajima Island, Kurashiki Canal City, Himeji Castle, the Korakuen Gardens and a great night of karaoke.

Our final leg involved a trip to Tokyo, where we had some final souvenir opportunities at Asakusa Temple and the final day at Tokyo Disneyland.

We now look forward to welcoming Toryo next year and our next Japan Tour in 2020, being the same year Tokyo will hold the Olympics! This is available to all students in Years 9-12 studying Japanese.
