FLINDERS P.A.R.T.Y EXCURSION

The P.A.R.T.Y (Prevent Alcohol and Risk-Related Trauma in Youth) Program is a one-day injury awareness and prevention program for youth aged 15 and older. Developed in 1986 at Sunnybrook Health Sciences Centre, this program is a vital component of the growing community effort to reduce death and injury in alcohol, drug and risk-related road crashes and incidents. We visited Flinders Hospital in Term 4 with a group of students from Years 10-12 this year.

A visiting student response to the opportunity to attend the excursion:

We were fortunate enough to attend the P.A.R.T.Y Program where we followed the journey of a trauma victim through the individual and specialised departments of Flinders Medical Centre following a simulated accident. The program not only provided information about drugs and alcohol and their impact on the lives of the victims of trauma, but also the impact on their families. With summer approaching, the staff also let us know about risk taking behaviours and potential trauma accidents through activities such as jetty jumping. Following the treatment of a patient after they have been in a car crash meant we had the opportunity to see the potential devastating impacts of our decisions.

On the day, we went around the hospital and learnt about the different procedures of nursing someone back to health through rehabilitation. This included trying the pureed food that is specially made for people who are unable to swallow solid foods as well as drinking thickened cordial. The curry or meat that had been blended into a thick slop was not appetizing. This experience highlighted the potential impact that my decisions could make on my future and my peers. I was pleased to be given the opportunity to attend.'

CURRICULUM MATTERS

WHY CONCEPT-BASED LEARNING?

In a rapidly changing and evolving world where information, facts and figures are attainable in a matter of seconds via the internet, applying knowledge critically, creatively, ethically and efficiently requires a different approach to learning.

Concept-based learning is driven by 'big ideas' rather than subject-specific content. Students consider the context in which they will use their understanding by considering it through the lens of concepts such as sustainability, connection, perspective, responsibility, empathy, change, form and function - to name a few. By doing so, students apply 'real world' meaning to their knowledge and skills.

For example, students may study the big idea of 'change' in a variety of areas, from patterns in mathematics, to civilizations in social studies, to life cycles in science.

There are many examples of conceptual learning occurring in the Junior School at any given time. Last week, our three Year 1 teachers Ms Harvie, Ms Galdes and Ms Francis, presented to educators from many schools at the Association of Independent Schools of SA (AISSA). They presented their examples of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander perspectives in the Science curriculum. The Science unit focussed on how every day we experience and use light and sound.





Traditionally this would have been content based, focussing only on the mechanisms of producing light and sound. But with the concepts of function (how do sound and light work) and causation (if I do something different with light or sound, how will it respond), then the depth of exploration and understanding significantly increases.

Students explored the connection between vibration and sound, and the effect that changes to tension/weight/width of the item making the sound had on the sound itself.


Many questions from students evolved including how does sound travel? Why can we hear it louder through a balloon? Students inquired into their questions and connected their experiences both to Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander examples, and the impact sound has on their daily lives.

From there they designed their own prototype for an instrument that created sound using the principles they had discovered about how sound works and is used (function), and how to adjust the sound their instruments produced according to different variables (causation.) Our Year 1 students were thinking critically, creatively, reasoning, and applying their understandings to real experiences. As acknowledged by the AISSA consultants, it was indeed a very rich learning experience for our Year 1 students.

Congratulations Year 1 students and teachers.
