We believe at Tatachilla that we provide the best transition for young people from a primary to secondary setting through our middle years program. The middle years begin at Year 7 which is our major entry point into the secondary school. This year has seen an additional stream added at Year 7, making a total of five classes. We do believe that Year 7 best assists our students' adolescent development in a changing and transitional time within their lives.

Year 7s have a smaller amount of teachers who support their wellbeing at this transitional time and a great range of specialist teachers that sparks the fire of learning within each of our individual learners. The People's Choice Award recipient Jess Reynolds in the Year 7 Free Choice Art Exhibition, displays how when the spark has been lit, the fire shines brightly. Below is Jess' artwork.

I love how Jess has set the scene of learning and spirituality in this painting. The lone human-being is set amongst the outdoors, looking out and beyond to the stars and the world. The trees beside them are protecting and guiding them, just like teachers, parents and mentors do in our young peoples' lives. Five stars in the sky are shaped like crosses. Each cross has a different size and shape representing the individual purpose, talents and vocation that God has given us.

DEVELOPING CURIOSITY AND A SENSE OF WONDER IN YEAR 7

YEAR 10 WORK EXPERIENCE

PREPARATION DAY - THURSDAY 31 MAY 2018

Before undertaking work experience it is a legal requirement that students are inducted in the following areas: Work Health & Safety Act 2012, Equal Opportunity and the Children's Protection Act 1993. Adequate time (approximately 5 hours) must be allocated to cover these topics effectively and students need to demonstrate their understanding. This induction will be done at Tatachilla Lutheran College on Thursday 31 May and is consistent with our duty of care to ensure that no student is placed where they may not be safe physically or psychologically. Year 10 students must attend on this day. Students will be required to wear clothes suitable for their work experience placement.



WORK EXPERIENCE FORMS

Work experience paperwork for Year 10 students is now overdue. Any outstanding paperwork must be returned urgently!

The Workplace Learning Agreement form must be signed by the student, workplace provider, parent/guardian (all arranged by the student) and finally the Principal (arranged by the College). The original Work Experience Agreement form then becomes a legal contract which sets the College insurance cover in place and must be retained by the College. Work Experience is a very valuable opportunity for most students, however it does take time to ensure that the above expectations are met.

SleepWalkin' is an annual Tatachilla event aimed to raise funds and awareness for the homeless. All monies raised are going to help the St Vinnies Winter Appeal - with most funds helping people in our local community. It is an opportunity for students in the Senior School to experience what it is like to spend a night in the cold with basic conditions and food.

This year's event will start on Friday 8 June at 3:30pm (end of Week 6) and finishes at 7:00am on Saturday 9 June, in the school gym and on the JS oval.

During the evening guest speakers from St Vinnies tell us about their work and some of the issues facing local people. Students get into groups of eight and walk the oval in shifts for 12 hours (6:00pm to 6:00am). Food consists of soup, bread and fruit. A basic breakfast is also supplied.

Money is raised by getting donations to attend or an amount of money per lap. Last year students did over 100 laps of the JS oval (well over 25km).

Students will walk, talk, play games, and try and get some rest in just a blanket or sleeping bag... with limited technology allowed.

NORTHERN TERRITORY AMPILATWATJA MISSION TRIP

Preparations are well underway for the 2018 trip to the Ampilatwatja community of Central Australia. A strong relationship has been forged between Tatachilla and the Finke River Mission with students working in collaboration with Ampilatwatja Leaders and Indigenous Elders to undertake hands-on practical service and strengthen meaningful relationships. Service trips assist in building mutual respect and strengthening an understanding of Indigenous perspectives.

The NT Mission Trip is a 2 week life changing experience that empowers students with knowledge and confidence to educate those surrounding them about the activities they have been involved in, cultural differences and equality for all Australians.

WILLUNGA FOOTBALL GUERNSEY RESEARCH PROJECT

During 2016 I took part in the annual Northern Territory Mission Trip to the remote Indigenous community of Ampilatwatja. My local football club were fully supportive of the trip and donated many sporting goods to share with the local Ampilatwatja Bombers football team. In essence of this experience I came back to my local town of Willunga questioning the lack of recognition for Indigenous Australians within the football club community. For my Research Project I worked with local Indigenous Kurna man Mr Allan Sumner and designed a football guernsey with an Aboriginal focus that expressed the rich Indigenous history and heritage of Willunga. This guernsey provided the Willunga Football Club with a vehicle to recognise local Indigenous culture.

Since the completion of the project in 2017 the Willunga Football Club have adopted the guernsey, proposing it to Great Southern Football League. In doing so they have successfully embedded an 'Indigenous Round' into the 2018 fixture. On 18 August, Willunga will host the inaugural Indigenous Round match against Victor Harbor at Willunga. Hopefully this is a successful day and is something that all clubs in the league will one day take part in.
