GETTING GRITTIER

Exactly a year ago, our newsletter article focused on the work of Professor Angela Duckworth and the importance of the development of grit - or resilience - in young people.

Simply put, Duckworth defines grit as passion and perseverance for long term goals. Her commentary regarding

the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic upon grit has been very interesting – and very honest. In a recent interview, she stated that it was absolutely normal and necessary for young people to feel concerned and 'stressed' about the world-wide crisis.

She also emphasised the importance of one's response to adversity, referencing Auschwitz Concentration Camp survivor and famous psychologist Viktor Frankl's statement: 'When we are no longer able to change a situation, we are challenged to change ourselves.' Duckworth has reinforced the importance of personal goals in managing the frustrations, changes and adjustments of living in times of restricted movement and socialisation. And, very interestingly, she emphasises the flexibility with which young people are able to adapt their thinking and behaviours – compared to that of older adults.

So, has the world-wide crisis and personal changes to routines had a significant effect on young people? Yes, it certainly has. And has it also enabled students to demonstrate their grit? I believe it has. In student statements below, there is encouraging evidence of enduring thinking and behaviour change that I hope lives on well beyond the disruption that has been experienced in the short term for our young people.

'Learning from home was a bit scary at first, but I knew it was important to give it a real try because I want to go to university and so I thought of it like that. How would I go if this was university? So, I thought of my learning differently and I actually enjoyed the freedom and flexibility of it. To be honest, there are parts of it I preferred even though coming back to school to see my friends has been great.'

Personally I've found throughout these quite difficult times, despite the disappointment of having a period without extra-curricular activities, I have had plenty of time to really focus on my schooling without getting distracted. Extra-curricular activities are a very important part of my life, but time without them has enabled me to develop a very strong and committed school work ethic, that hopefully I will continue as these activities begin again.

Working from home also gave me a new appreciation for actually being at school. Sometimes school is so stressful that you just feel like you want to be anywhere else, but when at home, I truly missed the interaction with peers and teachers, and the accessibility to collaborate with others within my schooling. I think that it has strengthened my bond with peers and teachers and really made me think twice before I complain about being at school.'

NATIONAL RECONCILIATION WEEK 2020

National Reconciliation Week is celebrated from 27 May to 3 June and marks 20 years of Australia's journey towards a more just, equitable and reconciled nation. It is also the twentieth anniversary of the Reconciliation walks of 2000. This year's theme was 'In this together', reminding us whether in a crisis or in reconciliation, we are connected and united as Australians.

Our students participated in a remote Reconciliation Breakfast, Week 6 Chapel and Home Class discussions, and an R-12 chalk experience to express the meaning of Reconciliation and our ongoing commitment to it at Tatachilla Lutheran College.

Year 11 Research Project Intensive Days occur in Week 9 of this term on Monday 22 and Tuesday 23 June. Attendance at this experience is very important for students to understand the requirements of this Stage 2 compulsory course. Students will be guided to consider their topics of interest; understand the purpose of research in education; learn how to reference accurately and understand the reliability of sources of information for research. There will be an expectation for students to undertake some holiday research work that will be due at the commencement of the new semester.

Year 10 Australian Business Week– including Work Experience Preparation Day will occur in Week 10 of this term from Monday 29 June through to Friday 3 July. The usual timetable is suspended this week as student teams spend the week working through the virtual challenges of running a business. The course attracts 10 Stage 1 SACE credits for successful participants and is an excellent opportunity for our young people to exercise their innovative thinking and entrepreneurial skills in a range of industry occupations.

DEEP LEARNING AND CONNECTIONS

This term our Middle School students have experienced an incredibly rich curriculum, that has been delivered both online and face to face. As we have returned to the classroom, our teachers are still keeping SEQTA up to date with relevant information about in-class activities and learning, and so we encourage all parents to continue to use this valuable portal to discuss the learning that is happening at school with their young people at home. Here is a snapshot of the learning in each year level:

In Year 7, Humanities students are learning about the rise and fall of Ancient Rome, and are now applying the historical skills they learned to an inquiry into an ancient civilization of their choice. This study links with the upcoming Science unit on simple machines, where they will investigate how machines have strengthened both the ancient and modern world.

In Year 8, students have just completed a unit on Fairytales and Intertextuality, and are about to begin a unit titled "Work together or crumble: the delicate balance of systems". Through this unit, our students will investigate the social systems of Shogunate Japan in Humanities, and in Science they will study body systems, resulting in a broad understanding of the various types of systems in our world.

In Year 9 Science, our students studied Physical Science, and some of our students used their knowledge of light waves to create pieces of art. The students have also been challenged in Humanities to confront some of the issues that are still prevalent for Indigenous Australians through the film "In My Blood it Runs." This powerful unit encouraged students to understand that we cannot ignore the past as history still negatively impacts our nation today.



We heard of some student reflections in our Middle and Senior School Chapel last week that focused on Reconciliation Week.
