At the ACLE5 conference in 2017, we had the opportunity to hear from Sir John Jones, who was knighted for services to education. His key messages to teachers are that they have a powerful impact on young people and how the learning they provide can make a profound difference in their lives. He said a number of things that have stayed with me and have guided me in leading the Junior School. One was about finding the right person for the job of

teaching. He starting by asking the question, "Would I want to be a child in their classroom?" and then described the right person as having particular key qualities:

- having shining eyes, that indicate a passion for their profession and vocation
- being filled with humanity and warmth
- having unconditional positive regard for all children
- a relentless pursuit of excellence always learning
- and finally, my favourite, a righteous indignation a strong sense of injustice over things that are not right or fair.

I've added 'collaboration' to this list, as the ability to work with others in teams and contribute to the collective outcome is important to me.

They also looked at the qualities of a teacher through the eyes of a child, asking, "What do children want from their teacher?"

Show some heart. Notice me. Ask about me. Listen to me. Laugh with me. Believe in me. Make the work hard. Explain it properly and let me try, and try again. Ask me brilliant questions, and keep telling me how I am doing. Make the lessons interesting. Make it about my world. Let me see how connected my world and the wider world is. Let me find the answers. If I get stuck, let me find my way out. Help children to find their inner genie, their inner greatness, and help them to change and grow.

STUDENT-LED CONFERENCES

Student Led Conferences (SLCs) will be held in all year levels this year, but in a different format due to COVID-19 circumstances. SLCs are another way of reporting how your child is progressing with their learning. It gives parents an opportunity to see children's learning and progress. All students have prepared electronic access to their learning via Seesaw, including some specialist learning areas, enabling SLCs to go ahead in this format. Access to SLC learning will be via Seesaw on your child's iPad from Friday 18 September 2020.

A QR code will be sent home for Reception families to enable access through your home device. (Instructions for Reception families to use the QR code will be sent home with the code.)

Please set aside 20 minutes for your child to take you through their SLC sharing and allow your child to lead the conversation. Students will demonstrate their understanding through a variety of different learning situations and reflect upon samples of work they have previously chosen to share with you. Students will be guiding you through their learning and you can ask questions along the way.

YEAR 5 LEARNING

A key focus of the learning in Year 5 this term has been centred around the concepts of 'perspective' and 'change and continuity.' We chose these concepts as they link well with our investigation into key moments in Australia throughout the 1800s, including the establishment of Adelaide as a British colony and the goldrush which began in the 1850s. We have investigated how the study of history involves analysing what has changed but also what has stayed the same. We have also tried to look at significant events from multiple perspectives.

In Week 4 we held a 'Perspectives Day'. This was a surprise for the students which began with the Year 6 classes entering our classes and telling us we had to leave. Our experience of displacement was then challenged further when the Year 6 students took our bags from our hooks and into the classroom. Student confusion and anger bubbled to the surface and we later discussed how this experience linked to the European colonisation of Australia.

Throughout this day students also were split into two different groups - the 'rabbits' and the 'bilbies'. Both groups had very different cultural and social norms. For example, one group hated wearing shoes and the other was repulsed by seeing feet. Both groups reflected that they found the other quite rude and very weird! We then connected this back to how our perspective is influenced by our own experiences.

We then visited The Creek area where 'gold' (small caramels in gold wrapping) were hidden. Students had time on the goldfields taking on different roles. When they were a female on the goldfields they were restricted in where they could go and the duties they were required to perform. When they were an Australian or American miner they worked in small groups and kept any gold they found for themselves. When they were a Chinese miner they worked in larger groups and shared the gold they found amongst their group. The final group were the police who enforced the law by checking for gold licenses. If a miner was caught without a license they could 'buy' one for a piece of gold. If they didn't have one they were put in gaol! Students reflected that they definitely had a greater appreciation of the different perspectives from the goldfields and that it was a harsh and often unfair place to be.

We followed this up with a re-enactment of the 'Eureka Rebellion' in Week 6. After studying the event we planned out details to make the re-enactment as historically accurate as possible.



In Week 6, we also hosted the Junior School Assembly and presented about 'perspectives.' We had an 'Ultimate Perspective Gameshow' where photos of different objects throughout the school, taken from interesting perspectives, were shared with the contestants needing to guess. Students also shared poetry they had written from the perspective of an animal or object. We also had a historical TV show called 'Back to History' where reporters interviewed different people from the proclamation of South Australia and also from the Ballarat goldfield in 1854.

We have had a lot of fun this term and learnt a lot about some of the significant people and events of the 1800s in Australia.



MIDDLE SCHOOL

Real world, conceptual learning is incredibly important and allows our young people to experience the curriculum, rather than just be taught the content. Throughout the Middle School, we have been focusing on giving students many opportunities to work as a professionals throughout the year.

YEAR 8 ENGLISH AND HUMANITIES

In Year 8 this term, students have been focusing on "How can we create a sustainable community?" and, in Humanities, have been working as town planners and environmental engineers, both learning about what a sustainable town may need, and then creating a blueprint for sustainable town that incorporated solutions to the town's energy needs, food production, transport and recycling options. In English they are working as film makers and entrepreneurs as they developed a documentary which subtly advertises a sustainable product that they have either researched and were inspired by, or one that they have invented themselves.

YEAR 7 ENGLISH AND HUMANITIES

Year 7 students have been working as natural resource managers as they look at water in our environment, weather patterns and natural hazards, and ways that these environmental issues can be managed more effectively in the future. In English, we have also looked at ways of communicating in an engaging way in order to deliver our message more effectively to a wider community.

YEAR 9 HUMANITIES

Students worked as representatives of individual nations in a simulated global summit in order to determine potential solutions to help restore different biomes on our planet. They learned about each individual biome and how to read data, analyse the individual problems that face each biome and work through potential solutions with a global mindset.

Our Middle School Science Faculty has also been very busy enabling students to work with real world issues and problems so they can see how what they are doing in the classroom can also be used in the world.

REAL-WORLD SCIENCE IN THE MIDDLE SCHOOL

"Science and everyday life cannot and should not be separated." Rosalind Franklin, English Chemist

The quote above tells us as Science Teachers at Tatachilla Lutheran College how important it is to teach Science in such a way that students can see how it is connected to not only themselves but also the world around them. Over the last couple of years, the Years 7-9 Science teaching team have been incorporating into their programs; engaging activities that enable students to have an understanding that what they learn in class does have a real-world context. Some activities that have occurred in Term 3 include:

BUILDING EARTHQUAKE PROOF BUILDINGS

In Year 9, Science students investigated the devastating effect earthquakes can have on people's lives and the destruction they can have on communities. Part of the investigation was to research the new technologies and building materials that are now used to make buildings less likely to be destroyed when an earthquake does occur. Their final task in groups was to build a two-story building (using only straws, string, paper clips, and pins) to not only hold weight but also do this with when an earthquake simulation occurred.





CREATING ENERGY EFFICIENT / SUSTAINABLE BUILDINGS

It has been suggested that if people in the world continue to use energy at the rate they are currently using it and produce the amount of waste at the rate we are currently doing by 2040, the impact this has on the Earth will be irreversible. In Year 8 Science as part of the Energy topic, students have been learning about renewable and non-renewable energy sources and how including certain features when building a home can make it more energy-efficient and produce less waste. With this knowledge, students have been using various house planning software to create a building that is sustainable and has little impact on the Earth's finite resources. Hopefully their final creations will be something that they could build as their home in the future which will have a smaller impact on the Earth compared to what is occurring at the moment.



SAVE THE BANDICOOT PROJECT

Research has shown that over 100 species of native Australian animals have become extinct over the last century, with more than 1,770 species listed as threatened or endangered. One of the species that is endangered is the Southern Brown Bandicoot that lives locally and is one of our residents in the Tatachilla EcoClassroom. This term in Year 7, Science students have been studying ecosystems and looking at the impact humans have had on the Southern Brown Bandicoot numbers.

As part of their investigation, they have had to create an enclosure for the Southern Brown Bandicoot to enable it to survive and breed so that hopefully, numbers can increase enough for it to be removed from the endangered animal list. For the enclosure to be suitable students have to have an understanding of the behaviour of the Southern Brown Bandicoot, the habitat it lives in, the food it eats, and the predators it has.

These are just some of the things that are occurring in the Middle School Science classrooms at Tatachilla now. It may be because of these types of activities that some of our students that graduate from Tatachilla may have just as much of an impact on the world as Rosalind Franklin had with her work and discoveries connected with the molecular structure of DNA and viruses.

I would like to direct you to the SACE Website – to review information about the subjects your student is undertaking, to enable your son/daughter to check their status, and to be privy to a range of information to assist students – from learning about the SACE 'COVID-19 readiness' strategies to preparing for examinations. The SACE website can be accessed via this link: https://www.sace.sa.edu.au/. They have a 'user-friendly' Google search engine within their website, so enjoy exploring!

All Year 12 students (and any Year 11s who have achieved their SACE and are not intending to return to full-time study next year) are required to check their SACE enrolment details – in particular, their name, date of birth, postal address and, most importantly, their personal (not school) email address. This is important because the SACE Board will email results to students, and the school email address for students who have officially left our school will no longer be available. Students are advised to make any adjustments that they are able to complete. If they are unable to make an alteration, students are asked to email me, deadra.peak@tatachilla.sa.edu.au with their details: name, SACE number, and information about what requires changing.

Copies of timetables for both the Trial Examinations and SACE Examinations (relevant to students at our school) have been sent to students and are included below. Students are encouraged to read the 'Examination Information for Students' which has been sent out previously, via email to families so they are familiar with processes and protocols.
