


WORK EXPERIENCE DAY



MIDDLE SCHOOL STEM CENTRE OPENING

We were honoured to officially open the Middle School STEM Centre on Tuesday 5 June. Our new state of the art Middle School STEM Centre was officially opened by the Hon. Mr David Fawcett, Senator for South Australia. We were also delighted to have many special guests with us including, the National Director of Lutheran Schools, Mr Stephen Rudolph; Executive Director of the Association of Independent Schools SA, Ms Carolyn Grantskalns; College Council Chair, Ms Sarah Anthoney; and past Design Technology teachers, Mr David Salisbury and Mr Paul Lambert, as well as College Council Members, local Lutheran Pastors, and parents and friends of the community who had contributed to the fundraising campaign for the facility.



We were also very proud of the way our Year 7 students showcased their learning and innovation in Design and Digital Technology, Maths, Science, the Environment and Art. As part of the opening I interviewed **Olivia Mackenzie** and **Annabella Broadstock** about the STEM project they are currently doing and here are their insights:

Can you share with us the concept you have been exploring in the STEM project?

Olivia: We have been researching on how to bring back the Southern Brown Bandicoot in Maths and Science. This includes going down to the EcoClassroom and designing a new enclosure for the bandicoots to live in.

What have you found out about Bandicoots?

Annabella: They are an endangered species. Sometimes people mistake them for rats and they kill them with poison. Also, feral cats and foxes like to eat them. We learnt that they have become an endangered species as their habitat has been destroyed in our local area through development.

Olivia: In Science we have been learning about biotic and abiotic organisms and dichotomous keys and human impacts on the environment. The bandicoots have been our main focus, mostly researching their habitat and diet along with finding out what they need to survive.

Annabella: In Maths we have been learning about measurement. We've been looking at area, perimeter, volume and putting objects to scale. We have been putting together a map with our groups of what we would like to see in the new EcoClassroom enclosure look like. Shortly, we will be building a 3D model of our map design.



Through Design & Digital Technology, explain how what you have learnt in these subjects will help you present your proposal to bring back the Bandicoots.

Olivia: With our laptops, we have been able to explore different ways of presenting projects. In Digital Tech, I am thinking that we could use hyperlinks and loops to create an interactive map to explore the enclosure in a different way.

Annabella: The Year 7s have also been learning how to use the 3D printers and how to make websites. I'm thinking we could use the skills we have learnt in Digital Tech and Design Tech and put them together. In Design Tech, we use the 3D printers to produce things, whereas in Digital Tech, we can use our laptops to design things such as 3D maps and programs.

It was wonderful to hear how students are creating concepts that we have not seen in our community before. We do not have an interactive map of the EcoClassroom or a 3D model, but it is through a STEM approach to learning that our young people are creating, making and innovating.

We invite Year 7 parents to an exhibition of learning at the end of the term to discover more about the innovations that have occurred in their learning. We also invite new families to come to a tour find out more about the Year 7 experience for 2019 and beyond.

This week we were also delighted to reveal the Year 7 Collaborative Art Mural. All students in Year 7 rotate specialist subjects in Art, Music, Drama, Design and Digital Technology. By the end of the year students will transfer skills and understanding across Art and Design Technology through creating a leaf that will be a part of the outback tree.

Every leaf on this outback tree represents the vibrant and expressive colours of our current Year 7 students. Without each individual student, there would not be the beautiful rainbow of colours you see; which makes up the whole leafy tree. At the end of each year the leaves are taken home by students to represent their first year of Middle School and the tree becomes bare ready for a new cohort of Year 7s to begin their journey.

Thank you to Mrs Skye McVicar and Mr Ian Proeve for guiding students in forming this collaboration between Art and Design Technology. We encourage you to drop by the Year 7 Centre to see the mural in person.

3B ECOCLASSROOM VISIT

This term Year 3 students have had the opportunity to visit the EcoClassroom and be involved in interactive and handson sessions. These sessions have explored local Indigenous Kaurna culture, the local environment and sustainability.

Our Environmental Coordinator, Mrs Dolores Amos, provided students with a 'bush tucker' tour of the EcoClassroom and shared her knowledge about Kaurna traditions, language and culture. The students learnt how the Kaurna people used resources from their natural environment for food, clothing, shelter and medicine.

Mrs Karen Lawrence, Environmental Officer, helped the students to explore how the past has shaped our present environment and what impact colonisation has had on native fauna, vegetation and natural systems.

Last Wednesday after assembly Mr Damien Weber visited the 3B classroom and played his didgeridoo with his daughter, Nara. Mr Weber shared knowledge about his culture and explained how his didgeridoo was formed. The students enjoyed the unique sounds produced through the didgeridoo and enjoyed identifying the different animals.

It has been wonderful to see students engaged in EcoClassroom and outdoor learning, making new connections about their local community and learning more about our local Indigenous culture.

RECYCLING 3D-PRINTED PLASTIC

The College has recently signed up with The DCycle Program. The program takes waste plastic from the schools 3D printers (we have four 3D-printers in the Design and Technology building and three in the new STEM Centre) and turns it into new 3D printing filament.

3D printing is the process of building three dimensional models by successively adding layers of molten plastic. The working principle is similar to that of a hot glue gun. The plastic used is in a string like form, known as filament, and is wound on a spool for use.

The College uses Polylactic Acid (PLA) as its preferred printing filament. PLA does not produce unpleasant fumes when printing, it is strong and durable yet is also biodegradable, unlike most other plastics, as it comes from plant-based products rather than from crude oil.

Sometimes prints fail, sometimes the 3D-printed model needs supports or a 'raft' to help it print. When this happens the plastic is usually discarded. Now, with the help of the DCycle Program, Tatachilla Lutheran College can continue to reduce landfill and look after the environment.

LITERACY AND NUMERACY VENTURES

I am excited to share that throughout this semester, opportunities have arisen for students to be involved in supplementary literacy and numeracy ventures.

Students were invited to join Mrs Thacker, Mrs Norman or me if they had an interest in fictional story writing or poetry writing. Mrs Norman worked closely with a group of Year 4 students who have been writing fictional pieces to be entered into the SA Young Writer's Award. Students could write about a topic of their choice in up to 1000 words. This eager group developed understanding of how to generate interesting story ideas; how to produce a sizzling story opener and how to capture and maintain the reader's attention.

In addition, Mrs Thacker and I have worked closely with small groups of students across Years 3-6 with a focus on poetry writing. Students have been practising various poetry techniques before creating their own poem for submission into the Dorothea Mackellar Poetry Awards. The theme for the 2018 competition is 'Promises I Keep' and students have enjoyed being immersed in different styles of poetry writing before crafting their own poem.



Every year schools from across Australia and New Zealand and other neighbouring countries compete against other schools in the Australasian Problem Solving Mathematics Olympiad Competitions. This year Mrs Southern is coordinating a Junior School team throughout Terms 2 and 3. The main aim of these competitions is to develop children's problem-solving skills in an enjoyable environment while developing efficient strategies and resilience when solving mathematical problems.
