LEARNING ENHANCEMENT

Throughout 2020, selected students in Years 5 and 6 have taken part in a problem-solving mathematics program with Mrs Southern, Maths Learning Enhancement Teacher Years 3-6.

The Olympiad competition was amended this year due to the global disruptions of COVID-19 to education, resulting in an inter-school competition where individual students' performance was measured against other students within the team. These students should be commended for their efforts as 'Team Tatachilla' who have progressed in their problem-solving skills.

Oscar Pritchard, Year 5, is congratulated for achieving the highest overall score for Team Tatachilla which is an outstanding achievement. 'The simplest prescription for improving education must be dollops of feedback." John Hattie, Tweet

Teachers spend a great deal of time thinking about, writing, providing and talking about feedback for students. We know it is vital to improving student understanding and performance. However, very often the value of teacher feedback is recognised

most successfully by Year 12 students in Senior School. The goal posts change in the mind of a Year 12 student and it is this alteration in thinking that can illicit the transformation in student attitude to information provided about their performance. We wish to encourage this kind of student ownership and understanding of assessment to occur at the commencement of the Senior School learning journey, not just at the conclusion of it.

Students understand that feedback and assessment occurs at a task level with teacher comment and direction in drafts and a grade for summative work. They are also aware of continuous feedback and academic report information that provides either an interim record of achievement for Term One and Three or a decisive assessment of achievement at the conclusion of a semester.

With so much assessment and reporting of student achievement, we should be confident that students are not only reading and understanding this important information – we should also hope that they are considering the way that one round of reporting and assessment in a term links to another. In fact, our aim in Senior School is that students consider their learning progress as a three-year experience that is linked from term to term and involves ongoing reflection and goal setting.

It is with this in mind that Year 10 and 11 students have been presented with their academic report information in a new and connected way through the Student Personal Achievement Record. It is our aim to encourage Senior Students to see and understand the links that we present to them in academic reports so it becomes more meaningful and purposeful. This information is provided to supplement our academic report information and does not replace it. The use of academic report data in a visual graphic style is increasingly referred to by its acronym SPAR for short term reference. This illustrative information represents the student's results for each semester and is provided from the first semester of Year 10 through to the first semester of Year 12. The Year 12 graduates of 2020 have been the first cohort to utilise the SPAR as a tool for goal setting and reflection. We are hopeful that the increase in student agency and voice that we have seen in the last 3 years will continue to grow. This certainly assists and contributes in the development of Personal and Social Capability for students too

Last week, Year 10 students attended an information session regarding the SPAR and received the first set of graphic report data. Year 11 students will focus on this goal setting in the next week.

Year 12 students were provided with the final record of their learning journey as they finalised their studies. We have also created a short film about the Year 12 students' experience of working with the SPAR and will release this soon.

In Home Class groups, we will encourage students to predict their next achievements and set goals to achieve them. Please encourage your son or daughter to share the SPAR information with you so you can discuss it together. Your support to encourage student consideration, ownership and reflection of their achievements is much appreciated as we work in partnership together.

WHAT IS A SPAR?

A Student Personal Achievement Record presents individual student academic report information for attainment and work habits in a visual graphic format. This record is cumulative and begins in Semester One of Year Ten. This information is then generated and linked to each subsequent semester report. Therefore students, and parents, will be provided with a set of data that tracks and informs them of their achievement in academic attainment and work habits from Year 10-12. The data will include the total attainment for subjects presented as a grade point average on the graph. An example of this data is provided below.

WHAT IS A GRADE POINT AVERAGE?

A grade point average (GPA) is the average result calculated for all of the student grades achieved for a semester round of reporting. The GPA is calculated using a 7-point scale where 7 is the highest and 0 is the lowest achievement.

WHY CONSIDER PROVIDING THIS INFORMATION TO STUDENTS?

In accordance with the Tatachilla Lutheran College focus of Seek Fresh Horizons, each learner is acknowledged and known as an individual with their story, achievements and challenges. We deliver personalised learning that focuses on progress, achievement and participation. Used as part of the process to track, analyse and use reliable data to measure student progress and achievement, an individual GPA calculation is designed to encourage student understanding and ownership of their learning progress.

HOW WILL THIS ASSIST STAFF AND STUDENTS IN PLANNING A STUDENT PATHWAY?

Tatachilla Lutheran College Senior School education plays a critical part in preparing students for post-secondary academic success and facilitating students' transition into post-secondary education and training. The implementation of a GPA is designed to assist students in preparation for, and understanding of, the tertiary education system and, to an extent, career readiness.

This information will also assist staff and students with the formulation of individual student pathways and understandings of the requirements of the tertiary system. Staff may use this information to guide students towards realistic and achievable outcomes and, if necessary, redirect students according to their achievements.

Students will be able to utilise this information in order to track their Senior School progress as a whole. With guidance from teachers, students will be able to analyse and reflect upon their academic performance and set goals to improve and increase attainment. This data enables students to view their academic performance as an infographic in a number of ways that the traditional academic report does not offer. For example, students can view their overall achievement; their literacy and numeracy achievement; their work habits and, unique to this data presentation, consider their progress from Year 10 through to Year 12.

HOW DOES IT WORK?


In its simplest form, the student's grades for subjects are added together using a numerical value and then divided by the number of subjects studied for the particular semester of reporting. The calculation is constructed to take into account anomalies such as VET courses or students completing a course that is accelerated.

Senior School Student Personal Achievement Record



The Student Personal Achievement Record provides you with your academic report information, including work habits, in an infographic in order to show your achievements for each semester from Year 10 to the final semester of Year 12. This information is calculated at the conclusion of each semester using a 7-point scale. The average attainment for all subjects of English and Mathematics are recorded individually.

The Student Personal Achievement Record does not provide you with new information. It presents your report data in an alternative way so that you can track your progress from semester to semester and set academic and work habit goals to improve your skills as a learner.



PREVENTING CRIME

HOME AND BUSINESS FIRE PREVENTION

Fires caused by deliberate, reckless or negligent behaviour not only destroy communities and properties but have the potential to kill. South Australia Police is committed to identifying and apprehending people who deliberately light fires or engage in reckless or negligent fire lighting behaviour.

To help keep your property safe from fire, consider implementing these crime prevention tips:

- Lock your property and vehicle at all times.
- Keep rubbish bins in a secure area and remove rubbish regularly.
- Secure all combustible materials and flammable fuels away from your property.
- External doors should have minimal gaps to prevent papers and flammable items being pushed inside the property.
- Maintain vegetation around your property and remove plant debris.
- · Maintain fencing and install external security lighting.
- Conduct regular inspections outside your property. Repair damage to fences and remove graffiti regularly.
- Join your local Neighbourhood Watch or Business Watch program to help keep the community safe.
