I can't get away from the fact that COVID-19 hovered over everything that we've done this year, bringing unexpected change to our well worn routines and a sense of uncertainty that isn't abating. We keep hoping that surely, next week, next term, next year, things will be back to normal. Most likely it will not be and the best we can hope for is a new normal.

However, looking at the Junior School at this end of the crazy year, it is still in a good place. Staff and students remain focussed and engaged in the core business of teaching and learning. We began the year full of optimism for the College's 25th anniversary year with the theme, 'Gathering together in light' and a focus on the Bible verse chosen to accompany the theme: 'For where two or three gather in my name, there I am with them.' Matthew 18:20

The challenge to, 'Prepare the child for the road; not the road for the child' seemed like a good way to start the year, and certainly 2020 has provided all of us the opportunity to learn some life lessons and develop resilience to navigate the road ahead. It could never replace coming together face to face, and personally, I missed the community singing in Chapel, seeing the children on stage presenting their learning in Assembly and coming together with Junior School families for Mother and Fathers' Day breakfasts and all the other community events.

We continue to value children's play as times of shared collaborative experiences, where they are learning how to work together, to be actively involved with enthusiasm and creativity. Regardless of what we do or don't provide in the way of playgrounds for the children, they bring play with them to school every day. As Tom Rosenthal writes; 'I'm not sure what the secret to happiness is, But I'm pretty sure it starts when you go outside, which is where the best play happens.'

What we have seen right across the Junior School community is a willingness to stay calm and positive in uncertain times - from the staff room to the classrooms and playgrounds. As a Junior School community we have weathered the challenges of this time very well.

STUDENT STATIONERY 2021

As per last year, Junior School stationery for 2021 will be included in the College tuition fee. All stationery will be delivered directly to your child's classroom, including plastic covers for exercise books. You will not need to order any stationery or cover any books for 2021.

2021 Receptions and all other new students in Years 1 to 6 for 2021 will receive new headphones and a Tatachilla library bag with logo. All other students are required to bring forward their black library bags and headphones from 2020. If headphones need replacing, the College recommends 'Moki Kids Safe' headphones. If you are unable to source this preferred model, it is advisable to make sure the headphones have a removable jack and a sound limiter. Earbuds are not used in the Junior School.

CURRICULUM MATTERS

A REFLECTION ON LEARNERS IN 2020

This year has been a time of change, unexpected curve balls and resilience. At the start of 2020, students had to adjust to their new classmates, teacher and learning environments, and build their class community. Then with little notice or time to prepare them, students were required to switch to Remote Education with many unknowns and different learning models. Subsequently students returned to school with new routines and habits to be established in line with COVID-19 expectations. This was a significant time of adjustment, and ultimately learning, for all our students, from our youngest five year old Receptions to our Year 6 leaders. As learners, they have indeed demonstrated exceptional resilience, growth mindsets, independence and capacity to engage with 'the new.'

GROWTH MINDSETS:

Learners of all year levels (and across our staff) have demonstrated this consistently throughout the year. They have developed habits and routines required to persist with learning remotely, attend Zoom meetings with their classmates and teachers, persist in the 'learning pit' to try another way and another way, and then returned to school to adopt a more collaborative approach to learning.

INDEPENDENCE:

Learners have demonstrated a higher level of independence than ever before. Reception students learnt very quickly how to access and operate their iPads for learning tasks, how to demonstrate their learning online, and especially how to walk independently into school without mum or dad walking them up to their classroom. Every Reception student has succeeded with this, setting themselves up for ongoing independence in 2021.

Thank you especially to our parents for supporting your child with being able to accomplish this. The Year 1 Nativity Chapel last week was a perfect example of student independence and confidence. Older students have found ways to creatively find suitable materials at home for their learning remotely, or adapt what they have, to engage with their learning, both remotely and at school. They followed this up with their Climate Change exhibition of learning in Week 6 where real issues affecting our school were identified using heat maps, investigated and interventions proposed and prototyped. Creativity has been another big winner and attribute our students have developed as learners.

RESILIENCE FOR 'THE NEW':

Flexibility, Manageability and Sustainability - for families, students and teachers - were the three core principles of the Junior School Remote Education plan, within the context of maintaining relationships between teachers and students, and students with peers. All three principles were crucial from a parent, student and teacher perspective in order to create quality Remote Education for our students. Unlike many overseas countries, Remote Education wasn't a lengthy exercise for us in SA. However, students and teachers have developed the capacity to pivot back to the remote platform and processes if and when it may be required in the future. Resilience for 'the new' has certainly been developed across our Junior School community.

Our students will no doubt reflect back on their educational experiences in 2020 for many years into the future. I am confident it will be with a great deal of pride in their growth mindsets, independence and resilience as learners. Well done parents, students and staff.

YEAR 6 CLIMATE CHANGE EXHIBITION

Throughout Semester 2, the Year 6 cohort have been working together through the 'LAUNCH' design cycle; a framework for learning that supports an informed design process. Students have worked through this in collaboration with the Onkaparinga Council, developing their knowledge, understanding and awareness of the impact climate change is having on our world.

Following these discoveries, students then worked in small groups to identify issues caused by climate change in our school and local communities. Students had evidence of these issues and worked closely with Rob Wallace, the Education Coordinator from the Onkaparinga Council, to develop and design solutions for these problems. Students created unique solutions for heat and extreme heatwaves, bushfires, flooding, storms and drought.

The Year 6s presented these prototypes at our Year 6 Climate Change Exhibition.

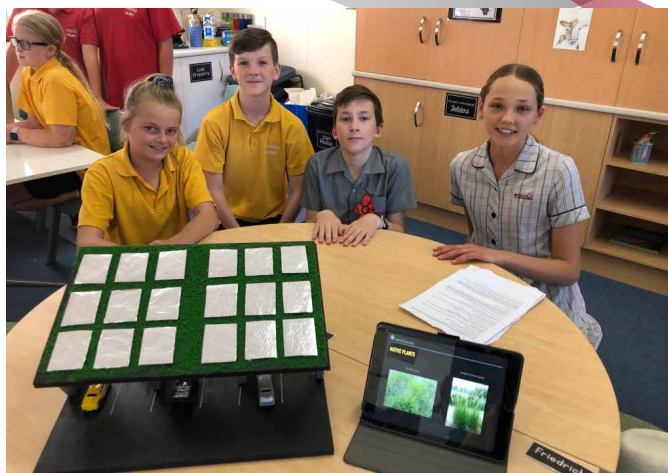
'I liked getting other people's opinions on our solution and being acknowledged for our hard work.' **Anna Goad**

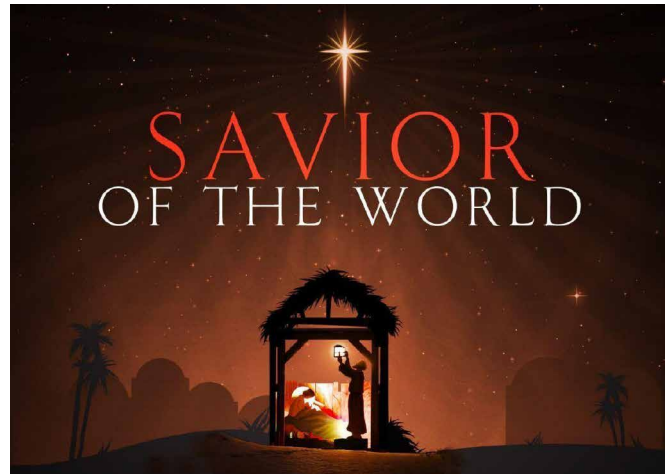

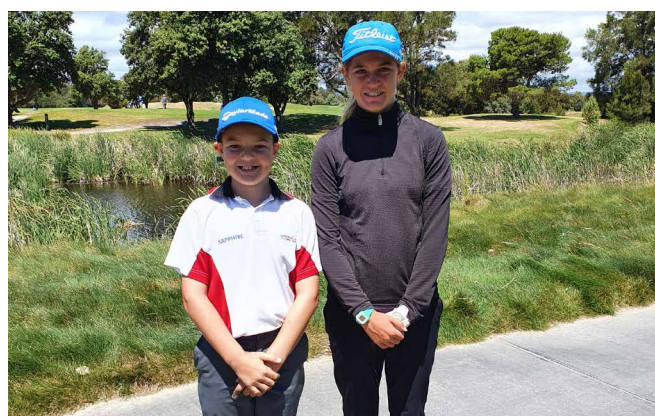
HOUSE CROSS COUNTRY WINNERS

RURAL FIRE PREVENTION

Fires can cause serious harm to people and properties. Whether deliberately lit or caused by reckless or negligent actions, fire can kill. Know your responsibilities, take positive action and report suspicious behaviour to police.

To help keep your property safe from fire, consider implementing these crime prevention tips:

- Erect fences and gates to identify your property boundaries – indicating private property.
- Immediately repair or replace any damaged sections of fencing or gates.
- Ensure security and warning notices are visible to people entering your property.
- Keep fertilisers and other chemicals in a secure location.
- Store petrol, diesel or other flammable fuels in secure areas and locked away when not in use.
- Inspect your property regularly to ensure rubbish, including glass bottles, are disposed of immediately.
- Remove hay from fields as soon as possible after harvesting and store it away from fuels, flammable goods and homes.

If you see anything suspicious immediately call police on 131 444. Keep a note pad in the car and record helpful details including:

- location of the suspicious activity i.e. RPA number and property name, road name, or identifying landmarks
- vehicle details i.e. registration number, make, model, colour and any distinguishing features (e.g. dents, stickers)
- characteristics of anyone acting suspicious i.e. age, gender, weight, height, hair colour and clothing.

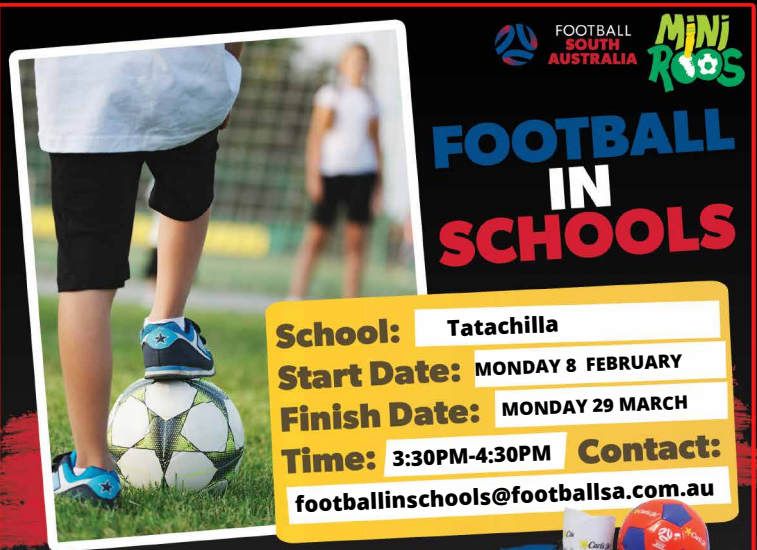
