from the JUNIOR SCHOOL

CURRICULUM MATTERS

Teaching and Learning is innovative, personalised and challenging.

We had an excellent number of parents attend the Junior School Parent Information Night. It was a joy to see so many parents keenly interested in their child's learning and the Junior School's beliefs and practices for how students learn best, ways we support learning and grow students' learning stamina, resilience and problem solving.

To this end, the diagram of The Learning Pit was briefly shared, with several parents requesting more information about it, both within the school context and how it might be adopted at home too.

The image adjacent provides an insight into how each stage represents student thinking, growth mindset and application of new learning.

Stage 1 Conceptual level


Students have a concept or problem to explore that they probably already know a little bit about. The challenge is for students to be prepared to delve deep into a space where they don't look for a quick answer, know they will need to try several options, will need to grapple with some confusion and a state of 'unknowing'.

Stage 2 Questioning

Students explore a range of possibilities based on questions they have developed in order to inquire deeply. They will hit dead ends, half answers, some helpful possibilities resulting in different questions being asked and explored.

Stage 3 In The Pit! Cognitive conflict

This is where, as teachers and parents, we are often tempted to 'rescue' students and either give them the answer or point them in the direction that will result in them definitely getting the 'right' answer. In fact, this is where the growth happens, the power of 'I don't know...yet, but I'm going to try...' or 'Hmmm... none of the ways I've tried so far have helped me move further in my understanding. I wonder if I need to change my questions or approach?', 'I wonder if my peers are trying different strategies that I could try...' This is where students investigate examples of where their approach has worked, and hasn't worked; 'so what can I learn from that?' This is where deep learning occurs that is transferable across other concepts and problem-solving situations.



Stage 4 Constructing: Clarity is occurring

As students explore the patterns, links and relationships between what they have discovered that worked and didn't work, they are starting to build a new framework of understanding about the concept or problem. The light is dawning! And it's exciting.

Stage 5 Considering/Reflecting

This is where they celebrate new understandings, with a genuine sense of accomplishment, and reflect back on what worked well and what didn't. Which questions were the most helpful in guiding the inquiries? How can I apply these to new situations? Noticeably, the height of the hill on the other side of The Learning Pit is significantly higher than the ledge at the start of The Learning Pit. This is deep, new learning and the sign of an accomplished learner.

This model of deep learning can apply to both collaborative learning and individual endeavour. As teachers, we assist students to reframe their questions, understand the value of a growth mindset, appreciate the importance that 'mistakes' play in our developing understanding, and the power of 'yet.' We look forward to partnering with our parents and students on this learning journey.

MATHEMATICS

At Tatachilla teachers strive to share their own interest and passion for Mathematics in their classrooms, instilling the belief in students that they can be good at the subject and helping them build an optimistic approach towards it. We attempt to link the concepts we are teaching to the real world and provide the time and support for our students to think deeply about problems.

Parents can help too by communicating positive messages: talking about mathematics as an exciting subject, an open subject that anyone can learn and expressing its vital function for the progress in so many fields.

Here are my top tips for encouraging a positive attitude towards Mathematics:

- Communicate the belief that everyone can learn Mathematics if they put in the effort.
- Understand that making mistakes is a valuable learning tool it is fine to struggle with a concept and make errors along the way.
- Encourage questioning asking and answering questions clarifies thinking and leads to deeper understanding.
- Promote discussions about Mathematics be explicit about the Mathematics you use day to day and in your work.
- Support deep thinking over speed.
- Express your beliefs about your own Mathematics learning with care.
- Keep assessment performance in perspective encourage striving for improvement but be realistic about goals.
