# SERVANT LEADERSHIP

'Leader' is often considered a title that belongs to certain people, like 'those in charge' such as politicians.

Yet being a leader is far more humble and common than that. Leadership can be performed by parents, teachers, and students every hour of the day. Doing a class presentation can be leadership, helping someone with their homework can be leadership, looking out for a person who is lonely can be leadership, rocking a baby can, most certainly, be leadership.


Jesus taught a very clear and, at the time, counter-cultural version of leadership that we now call 'servant leadership'.

The way servant leadership works is guite different to the traditional model of leadership where one person (the leader) tells other people (those who are not leaders) what to do. Servant leadership is different. Servant leadership is about humility and leading through modelling. A servant leader might look like the boss but will also wash the dishes of the workers. A servant leader might wear the tag 'manager', 'CEO', 'parent' or 'captain' but will also feel they have led well when the least of their team is happy and fulfilled. The servant leader is the first to apologise, the first to find good in others, and the first to give of themselves even if it means feeling embarrassed for a time.

Teaching servant leadership to young people is guite doable, but it does take persistence. When students see humility in their parents, teachers, and significant adults, they tacitly learn servant leadership. Mistakes are always made in the process of teaching servant leadership, but the outcome of a young person transforming into a mature servant leader is a gift for our world. All businesses, governments, schools, institutions, and families need servant leaders.

# THE TIMETABLE

The College timetable is made up of two main parts: the grid, which is the timings of lessons and breaks across the day; and the schedule of lessons, which in the Junior School, relates mainly to the specialist lessons of PE, Japanese, Visual Arts and Performing Arts. The remainder of the time is used at the discretion of the class teachers.

This year the grid changed. Lunch was moved from 1pm to the earlier time slot of 11:30am with a 10 minute supervised eating time; and recess had become afternoon tea at 1:40pm. Fruit break is at 9:50am and has been lengthened to allow for a short play or fitness time.

Our experience with the main eating and play break being at 1:00pm, was that children were often very hungry, or even a bit 'hangry' by then, and/or were wolfing down their food in a hurry to get out to play.

Because we are a Reception to Year 12 College, we also sought to keep the same grid across the whole College, and we have largely achieved this. For the Junior School, this means that specialist lessons are now 40 minutes, instead of 45 minutes, but it allows staff to work across both the Junior School and in the Middle and Senior School. There are some differences between the Junior School grid and the Middle and Senior School, but we feel they are manageable.

However, you may have noticed that the schedule of lessons took a while to be finalised, and in fact, it wasn't until last week that we could settle on a final Junior School timetable. This has been a bit of a frustration for some parents, and I apologise for the inconvenience in establishing your school routines for the year. By now you should have been told what days to wear PE uniform, and be able to plan for the week.

Thank you for your patience and understanding as we have worked through the various constraints that shape the timetable.

# PARENT TEACHER INTERVIEWS

Parent Teacher interviews provide an opportunity for a discussion between a parent and their child's class teacher, or specialist teachers, about the child's progress and learning as they have settled into the new year level and classroom community. Your child's teacher may request your child is present at the interview for part of the time. This can be negotiated between parents and the class teacher.

Families can also request an interview with specialist teachers in Visual Arts, Performing Arts, PE and Japanese.

Interviews for Reception students and families involved in IEP meetings are optional, otherwise we would like to see at least one parent from each family at the interviews.

A crèche will be provided in the Library. Please sign in your children and collect them at the conclusion of your interviews.

We recommend that you do not make consecutive interview appointments if you have more than one child in the Junior School, but allow time between the interviews to walk to the next classroom. Parent Teacher Interviews will be held on Tuesday 23 and Wednesday 24 March. This is Week 9 of the term. Both evenings will be scheduled as follows:

- first available interview at 3.30pm with the last interview concluding at 8.00pm
- a crèche will be available
- there are a limited number of before-school interviews, depending upon the availability of your child's teacher.

Bookings will be made through SOBS. The portal will open on Monday 15 March. Details on how to book using SOBS will be sent home shortly.

COVID precautions will be taken, such as asking parents to check-in using a QR code and to practise social distancing.

We look forward to welcoming Junior School parents on these important evenings.

# PICKING UP YOUR CHILDREN AFTER SCHOOL

If you are running late, and not able to collect your child by 3:40pm, when the duty teacher goes off duty, this is the process the Junior School staff will follow:

If your family is registered with Camp Australia, the teachers will take the child to the OSHC room where Camp Australia staff will attempt to contact you, and if successful, will look after the child until you arrive, unless the staff to student ratios will be exceeded which may mean they are not able to look after the child. If Camp Australia cannot get in touch with the parents, the teacher will bring the child over to the Main Administration Office where a College staff member will take over the care of the child.

If your family is not registered with Camp Australia, your child will be brought over to the Main Administration Office by the staff member on duty, where a member of College staff will take over the care of the child and try to contact a family member.

If you know in advance that you are going to be late, please make arrangements for your child to go to OSHC, or expect to pick them up from the Main Administration building.

Children cannot be left unattended in the Junior School pick up zone after school.

# **JS LEARNING ENHANCEMENT**

The 'Response to Intervention Model' is a multi-tiered approach to the early identification and support of students with learning or behavioural needs. We aim for all students to access and engage in the curriculum at Tier 1 whereby their learning needs are met through 'high quality teaching, appropriately differentiated for individual students.'

#### **Response to Intervention Model:**

In the Junior Primary years, we prioritise early intervention and the coordination of small group support at Tier 2. This is a proactive strategy to assist with students' development of English, Mathematics and social/emotional skills.

In 2021, we have a number of students in Years 1 and 2 accessing MiniLit groups. MiniLit stands for 'Meeting Initial Needs in Literacy' and it is an evidence-based early literacy program designed by MultiLit. It is a comprehensive program following an explicit and systematic approach to literacy teaching and learning for young struggling readers. The program is an 80-lesson format with student groups learning and progressing at similar rates.


As students move to the upper primary years, we aim to develop independent learners. The use of assistive technology is one strategy that can assist students with specific learning challenges to achieve this. For example, some students will benefit from using predictive text when recording on an iPad or using speech to text as an alternative to writing. These are positive adjustments that allow students to remain successfully engaged at the Tier 1 level.

Mrs Mandy Southern continues to deliver small group and personalised Maths lessons to students with specific gaps in their Maths skills across Years 3-6, as well as working closely with more able mathematicians in these year levels. In Years 4-6, Mrs Alison Watson is collaborating with teachers and has identified priority areas such as reading to further support literacy skills. These include exploring inferencing skills in Year 5 and developing reading fluency to enhance comprehension in Year 4.

In collaboration with class teachers, we complete a termly process of monitoring and reviewing to ensure that we continue to respond to students' needs, celebrate progress and personalise further as necessary.

# **MOBILE MUSTER**

The Middle School Student Rangers are running a 'Mobile Muster.' This involves members of the school community bringing in any old and unusable mobile phones, phone chargers and any electronic accessories (bluetooth, headphones etc). # **STAGE 2 CHEMISTRY**

In Stage 2 Chemistry last week the class consolidated learning how we can distinguish between primary, secondary and tertiary alcohols. The oxidizing agent used in these reactions is normally a solution of sodium or potassium dichromate(VI) acidified with dilute sulfuric acid. If oxidation occurs, the orange solution containing the dichromate(VI) ions is reduced to a green solution containing chromium(III) ions. Primary alcohols can be oxidized to form aldehydes and carboxylic acids; secondary alcohols can be oxidized to give ketones. Tertiary alcohols, in contrast, cannot be oxidized without breaking the molecule's C–C bonds.

It was fun to see the change in the colour from orange to green demonstrating that oxidation had occurred!
