THE KINDNESS REVOLUTION

"To be kind – always and to everyone – is to be fully, gloriously human, and every act of kindness is one more step towards a better society."

Hugh Mackay AO, Social Psychologist, ANU Honorary Professor and author has spent 60 years studying social analysis, psychology, communication and ethics. At the recent launch of his new book, at the 2021 Hawke Institute address at the University of South Australia, Hugh reflects on "what it means to be human, what really matters to us?" He asks the audience if we despair in relation to "man's inhumanity to man" as reported daily in the media. Do the behaviours we keep seeing – the level of violence; the continued gender wars; politicians behaving badly, concern us? He reminds us that acts of kindness happen every day – but don't always get reported.

Behaving kindly is an inherent part of what it means to be a part of our cooperative species. We are a social species. Neuroscientists confirm we are hard-wired for cooperation we thrive on creating social harmony, establishing families, communities, workplaces, schools that provide the emotional security we all need, that comes from a sense of belonging. We are built to be each other's neighbours, friends, colleagues. We need social harmony to survive. (McKay, 2021). Kindness is in our power, even when fondness is not. (Samual Johnson). Kindness is a way of being in the world. Whenever we face a crisis, we draw on our outpouring of love. We are prepared to make personal sacrifices for the common good. Humans behaving like humans. Look what the pandemic has brought out in us. Looking out for the frail and elderly in our street; calling those at risk of experiencing loneliness; these are all an expression of human love. Thank you to all the people who give up their own ambition for the good of their family; those volunteering to feed the poor and homeless night after night; those coaching

migrants in speaking English and offering a welcoming smile; retired school teachers in Victoria in 2020 who came out of retirement to coach home-schooled children after the lockdown so they didn't fall behind in their education; older Australians that plant trees for others to enjoy.

Kindness is strong at Tatachilla. Our students help wherever they can. Our staff give their time to help students get ahead with their learning and co-curricular activities. A kind smile. So many acts of kindness within our classrooms, within our school community, with events helping those less fortunate in our community. Thank you everyone for all you do.

RECONCILIATION WEEK

I continue to be inspired by our talented youth. One of the most powerful speeches I have heard recently is from Mitch Tambo, Singer/Songwriter on Q&A last week. He's not afraid to be bold! He's not afraid to be brave! He's not afraid to ask for help. Indigenous Australians make up 3% of Australia's population and yet they are grossly over-represented in our prisons, live tough lives fighting chronic disease, with many dying at such a young age. Mitch is using his voice for good. Mitch is using his creative talents for good. His words struck a cord with many and I'd like to share his plea for help with our students, staff and families:

"please empathise with us, please get on our story and listen to our story because we need you...We need everyone. And we all need to come together and love and accept one another regardless of race, religion, gender, sexuality and class...We must come together...We're in the final hour and we need each and every single one of you from every walk of life so we can journey together into a greater future...I think it's important that we educate teachers, we educate educators and get to the kids because the reality is that's where we've got a greater scope to build capacity, build empathy and build a heart that's geared towards hearing our story. Sitting with us and hearing our truths. We can't turn our head away any more to the truth of what happened here. It's not to point fingers and I don't come from that position because I want to bring us all together so we can heal. I'm crying out for healing for my people."

I urge our students to do the right thing in relation to all these matters. We are committed to excellence in our community.

Thank you to our families for working closely with us as we move forwards together to provide quality learning for your children at Tatachilla. Let's work together; let's listen to each other; as we live each day fully in the Love of Christ.

BUS SERVICES

A TIME TO REFLECT ON STUDENT LEARNING AND GROWTH

Our staff collaborate together to create meaningful and rich learning experiences where the skills that students develop can be transferred across all of their learning areas. We are certainly seeing the capabilities of our young people shine through this collaboration.

We encouraged parents to keep viewing SEQTA weekly with your child to see upcoming assessments, results and feedback on assessment tasks that teachers have given. We encourage to use some of these questions to help guide conversations with your child;

- Can you show me a piece of your learning that you are really proud of?
- What is your top priority on your to do for list this week and why?
- What tasks do you find challenging and why?
- Write of list of questions you need to ask or find the answers to help you tackle these challenges
- How is your study time going in school and out of school hours? Are there some changes we need to make?
- What concept in your learning do you find makes you think deeply at the moment?

LEARNING ENHANCEMENT

In Year 3, we launched a LEGO® Club to aid, teach and support social communication.

In groups of three, students are challenged to work as a team to build a LEGO® model. The team based approach adopted when students take on the roles of Builder, Engineer and Supplier, requires development of various different social communication skills.

Sharni Raymond, Year 3 Learning Support Officer, facilitates these groups and each student's role is crucial to the overall success of the LEGO® model being completed. Students take turns in the designated roles and each week they are challenged as a group to improve the time it takes them to successfully build the LEGO® model. The aim is to complete the LEGO® model in a timely manner using teamwork, collaboration and positive communication.



from the **ECOCLASSROOM**

WHAT'S NEW IN THE ECOCLASSROOM?

Stage 2 of the EcoClassroom is now home to five new Brush-tailed Bettongs. They are called Clancy, Phill, Lizzy, Noel and Dolores and they are part of a breeding program in conjunction with Zoos SA. These Bettongs are part of a bigger project to re-establish wild populations on Yorke Peninsula.

These Bettongs will be monitored for genetic diversity, predator awareness and self sufficiency over the next year and it is planned to release some in June 2022.

We are hoping to limit the amount of human interaction that these little folks have so they are fully prepared to live in the wild.

We still have lots of Bettongs in Stage 1 who are more used to human presence.



CONSERVATION TIP

Now is a great time to plant local native plants. The soil is still warm which they like, and the autumn and winter rains will help the plants get established before summer. Some of our favourite local native plants are: Allocasuarina verticillata (Drooping Sheoak) a lovely small tree, Olearia ramulosa (Twiggy Daisy-bush) a great shrub for small birds to enjoy, and Dianella brevicaulis (Coast Flax-lily) a lovely native lily with pretty flowers.



TRASH TALK THANKS

Thanks to the hard work of the weekly recycling groups and classes, we're noticing a big reduction in our waste to the landfill bin. The garbage truck now picks up one dumpster of waste a week rather than two! This could not be done without staff and students making the effort to choose the correct bins to put items into.

An extra thank you to Rebecca Schirmer and Megan Norman's Year 4 classes for helping to sort out the school's weekly recycling. Also, a big shout out to **Rebecca Evans** Year 7 student, and Mr Eric Thiel for their mammoth effort on Thursday of Week 3, to sort through the weeks' worth of recyclables.

FOOD GARDENING TIP

Early June is a great time to plant garlic for harvesting in November. All you need is some Australian, ideally organic, bulbs (overseas garlic may have been treated to prevent growing). Then you plant individual cloves with the pointy bit facing up just under the soil surface, spaced about 10-15cm apart. Garlic loves full sun, but hates competition so keep removing nearby weedy neighbours.

CAIN GRADUATES AS POLICE OFFICER


On Wednesday 26 May former Tatachilla Principal Cain McDonald marched into Lutheran schooling's folklore as the first Lutheran Principal to become a South Australian Police Officer.

Cain served Tatachilla as Principal from 2015 to 2020 before making a surprise career move to the South Australian Police Force commencing his training at the Fort Largs Police Academy in August of 2020. After over nine months of intense law study, physical fitness development, firearms training, and numerous other proficiencies required by SA Police Officers, Cain graduated with distinction along with his 22 squad mates from Course 43. Cain earned the squad's Commissioner of Police Leadership Award for his role in guiding himself and his colleagues to success. Being visibly popular with both his peers and superiors, Cain demonstrated that he is already valued in the SAPOL community.

After the formal graduation ceremony featuring the police band and mounted branch horses, guests were taken on a tour of the state of the art training facility. Cain showed us the formal indoor and outdoor training areas as well as a scenario village. Much is required of a modern Police Officer and SAPOL's training institution wants to provide the highest level of preparation it can. Cain spoke fondly of his months at the Academy and his experiences so far despite the intense physical, mental, and emotional challenges.

We wish Cain all the very best and God's richest blessing upon him and his wife Mel in this new chapter of their lives.

STUDENTS REFLECT FURTHER ON COLLEGE 2021 THEME

Our Tatachilla theme for 2021 is:

and is inspired by St Paul's insight on the nature of God - "By His power He connects all of creation together" (Colossians 1:7)

Our Week 3 Year 7-12 Chapel focussed on our connection with the environment. We explored some of Greta Thunburg's work as a young environmentalist as well as practical ways students can connect themselves to the healing of the damaged planet. We introduced our new EcoClassroom Educator Ms Dani Austin, and interviewed our head of ICT Mr Chris Till as he spoke about electric cars and ways of combining high tech with positive ecological outcomes. Chris taught us that an ecological worldview is not just for those interested in such things, but it is common sense for everyone.

Our discovery at Tatachilla is that there is a lot of student interest in ecology. Not only do young people have an innate attraction to nature, but they have the energy and confidence to engage change. We need change if humanity is to do well. We welcome parents not only to engage their children in this area, but to find practical ways by which the College's guidance on ecology can be supported at home. If the message is constant - reduce, recycle, reimagine - then we are part of the solution.




Welcome
