Capital adventures: an unforgettable Canberra experience for our Years 6 students



In Week 5 our courageous Year 6 students set off on a highly memorable journey to Canberra — a highlight of their final year in primary school and an established Tatachilla rite of passage.

The week was packed with discovery and connection as students explored the heart of our nation's capital. From standing beneath the flag at Parliament House to diving into hands-on learning at Questacon, each day brought new adventures and lasting memories.

The trip included a tour of the Senate and House of Representatives at Parliament House as well as visits to the Royal Australian Mint, Australian War Memorial, Embassy District, National Gallery of Australia, Australian Institute of Sport and the National Arboretum.

The Year 6 students also had the opportunity to spend time at the Museum of Australian Democracy, the Aboriginal Tent Embassy, the National Portrait Gallery and - during their return journey - the Sydney Opera House.

During the trip, friendships grew stronger and students embraced challenges together, building resilience and class spirit.

During our visit to the Australian Institute of Sport, we gained an exciting insight into what it's like to be an elite athlete in Australia. We toured the world-class facilities and had the chance to watch the Australian women's volleyball team and national swimmers in training. One of the highlights was exploring the Sportex room, where we tried out interactive simulators that gave us a taste of various sports in a fun and engaging way.
