

Top scores for Tatachilla's problem solvers



Selected students from Years 5 and 6 have demonstrated exceptional mathematical thinking through their participation in the Australasian Problem Solving Mathematical Olympiads (APSMO) 2025 program.

The challenging competition, involving more than 150,000 schools across the region, encouraged students to apply their mathematical knowledge in problem-solving situations and explore different strategies and solutions with their peers.

Congratulations to **Jacob Wu** (Year 6), who achieved the highest overall score for 'Team Tatachilla'. Jacob, along with **Oscar Hayball-Diener** (Year 6) and **Hugh Chivers** (Year 5), placed within the top 10% of all participants, while **Jayden Smith** (Year 6) achieved a result in the top 25%.

They build confidence, reduce anxiety and improve communication skills in a low-stakes environment, giving students practical experience in answering interview questions, presenting themselves professionally and arriving punctually and prepared.

Emerging investors put their skills to the test



Our Year 10 Commerce students recently put their financial knowledge to the test through the ASX schools sharemarket game, a national competition that simulates real-world investing.

Congratulations to **Hudson Boal**, who achieved the top ranking among Tatachilla students in this semester's competition.

All Year 10 Commerce students took part in the national challenge, each starting with a virtual \$50,000 to invest in Australian shares over a ten-week period. The simulation encouraged students to apply their understanding of markets, risk and strategy—skills developed through their unit in Personal Finance and Investing, earlier in the semester.

Hudson's outstanding result of a +9% return in just ten weeks reflects strong analytical thinking and an excellent grasp of financial markets.

Studying Commerce at Year 10 equips students with valuable real-world knowledge in money management, investing and economic decision-making—skills that benefit them in everyday life and prepare them for future career pathways in business, finance and entrepreneurship.

This elective subject provides a practical foundation for further studies in Economics and Business Innovation in the senior years.

Tatachilla entered two junior teams, with each runner covering part of the 21km total course. The junior boys ran strongly to finish 7th, while the junior girls achieved an outstanding 2nd place—marking the third consecutive year that our junior girls have earned a podium finish.

Rising stars take part in SASI Talent Search Program

On Thursday 24 October, Year 9 students from Tatachilla Lutheran College's Advanced Athlete Development Program were given a rare glimpse into the world of elite sport when they took part in the South Australian Sports Institute (SASI) Talent Search Program at SASI's brand-new, state-of-the-art headquarters in Mile End.

Before undertaking their performance testing, students were treated to a behind-thescenes tour of the cutting-edge training and recovery facilities used by South Australia's top athletes. The visit offered a firsthand look at the dedication, technology and support systems that underpin high-performance sport at the professional level.

The SASI Talent Search Program is designed to identify and nurture young athletes with the potential to one day represent Australia on the Olympic or Paralympic stage. As part of the program, students completed a series of tests measuring speed, power, endurance and physiology — including a 20-metre sprint, vertical jump, beep test, and body measurements such as height, weight and arm span.

Each participant will soon receive a personalised Sportmatch report, revealing the five sports most suited to their individual athletic profiles.

Tatachilla's Health and Physical Education Learning Leader, Michael Goode, said the experience was both inspiring and eye-opening for students: "It's not every day young athletes get to stand where future Olympians train. This experience gave our students a real sense of what's possible — and reminded them that with passion and hard work, the pathway to elite sport is within reach."

The day was a powerful blend of challenge and inspiration, leaving students motivated to pursue their sporting dreams and continue exploring their athletic potential.



Celebrating the school journey



As our soon-to-be graduates undertake their final exams, our Year 12 families now have a special opportunity to look back on how far their children have come since the first few days of school. One mum recently shared a beautiful tradition that captured this journey in

the most meaningful way.

For 13 years, from the very first day of Reception to the final weeks of Year 12, she quietly gathered small keepsakes that told the story of her daughter's schooling. In a simple folder, she collected daily reflections from preschool, pieces of creative writing from primary school, school reports, certificates, photos, artwork, and later, journal entries and essays from the senior years.

On the night of her daughter's graduation, the family came together to open the folder and relive those memories. Her older sisters rearranged their social engagements in honour of this family tradition which they themselves had experienced when it was their turn to finish school.

Early stories written in uneven handwriting, class photos filled with missing teeth and mismatched uniforms, and teenage reflections that showed growing independence and maturity were bundled together with love.

There were moments of laughter, nostalgia and pride as they saw how much learning and life had taken place between those early pages and the final ones.

This thoughtful gesture turned graduation night into something much more personal — a celebration not just of an ending, but of the entire journey of growth, learning and change.
