The service was filled with memorable moments with our Principal Alison Thacker and Toryo High School Principal Fujimoto speaking at the event and joining one another on stage to exchange gifts.

Tatachilla students had a wonderful opportunity to learn more about life at a Japanese school, with the Toryo students performing their school song on stage. Our junior years students showed their appreciation of our guests by presenting each Toryo student with a personalised gift and message they had thoughtfully created. It was heartwarming to see our youngest students enthusiastically wave and cheer as they met our visitors.

Our Toryo High School guests, who arrived on Sunday, have had an action-packed week. In the past few days, they have taken part in a boomerang workshop in the EcoSanctuary, PE, Food Technology and Japanese lessons at the college and visited the Fruchocs Factory in McLaren Vale.

When the students haven't been attending lessons or going on excursions, they have been enjoying time with their host families and practising their English. Today, the students are continuing to immerse themselves in Australian life, joining their host siblings on a special visit to Cleland Wildlife Park, where they will meet kangaroos, emus and other Australian native animals.



It has been wonderful to form meaningful connections with the students and staff from Toryo High School, while giving our students the opportunity to develop a deeper understanding of Japanese culture. Tatachilla students have formed lasting friendships, created wonderful memories and gained experiences that will stay with them long after the exchange has ended.

Molly Walker makes history at Glasgow 2026



Molly Walker (Class of 2023 and Advanced Athlete Development Program alum) has taken home not one but two bronze medals at the Glasgow 2026 Commonwealth Games. Molly's history making swim has put her firmly on the map as a rising swimming star.

Molly was one of an elite few female swimmers to compete in the first-ever Women's 1500m freestyle event where she clocked up a new personal best (PB) time of 16:01.37. Her performance caught the attention of champion swimmer and gold medallist Ariarne Titmus who praised Molly saying, "You don't see 12 second PBs very often, let alone at this level of swimming."

Molly's Commonwealth Games success didn't stop there. Just two days later, Molly secured another podium position for Australia, taking out the bronze medal in the Women's 800m freestyle final in an impressive time of 8:25.93. Molly became one of Australia's newest dolphins and secured a spot at Glasgow 2026 after her PB time in the 800m Women's freestyle. Molly's double-bronze win tops off a phenomenal debut at the Commonwealth Games. The college community is beyond proud of Molly's achievements and has been part of her cheer squad since her time in the Advanced Athlete Development Program. What a super star! We're so proud of you Molly.

Tessa Ebert inspires as she chases her American dream

The biennial event, which is taking place in Oregon this year, showcases the world's best athletes aged 20 and under.

Tessa, who is the daughter of Tatachilla Lutheran College's Student Counsellor Mike Ebert, recently took time out of her busy training schedule to visit the college before she headed stateside for the world championships. Tessa met with our Year 6 classes to talk about the qualities of effective leadership. She shared inspiring stories about overcoming challenges, facing adversity, and how leadership, resilience, and consistent hard work have been key to her journey and success.

It was a wonderful, memorable afternoon and a fantastic learning opportunity, with our students asking thoughtful and engaging questions. Brave little Ozzy inspires our community



Meet little Ozzy. He's the long-nosed potoroo battler who melted our hearts, then inspired us with his bravery and resilience. We first met little Ozzy when his mum, EcoSanctuary resident Betty Boop fell seriously ill. Our EcoSanctuary staff knew they had to act decisively to help Betty Boop and her joey Ozzy survive. After consulting with native wildlife veterinarians, the team made the difficult decision to temporarily remove Ozzy from his Mum's pouch to give her the best chance of fighting a serious bacterial infection and helping Ozzy continue to thrive.

Tatachilla EcoSanctuary Coordinator Tom Hurley says, "Ozzy's mum had taken great care of him, and although he was only three-months old and weighed 96 grams, he was in great shape, so our veterinary team assessed Ozzy and recommended hand-rearing him while his mum battled her infection." Tragically, Betty Boop succumbed to her illness. The EcoSanctuary wildlife team faced the delicate challenge of hand-rearing Ozzy before releasing him into the wild to join the EcoSanctuary's thriving population of potoroos.

At first, Ozzy struggled with the loss of his mum and the EcoSanctuary team worried that he may not pull through. Under the expert care of Aldinga Veterinary Services, Southern Koala and Echidna Rescue and our wonderful volunteers Jane, Deb and Peter, Ozzy recovered his strength and was transferred to the EcoSanctuary Rescue Centre.

There, the EcoSanctuary's native wildlife team helped him acclimatise to the sights, sounds and smells of the native wilderness with carefully managed nightly visits from his potoroo family and friends helping him gradually reintegrate into his colony.

Tatachilla Lutheran College students have played an active role in supporting little Ozzy's recovery. Several classes quietly observed feeding sessions, with some students crocheting pouches for Ozzy to sleep in. "The care and kindness of our students have helped Ozzy recover from his misfortune, and the much-needed substitute pouches they made kept Ozzy feeling safe, secure and warm," Tom says.

“Successfully hand-raising and reintroducing native animals to their natural environment truly takes a community,” Tom says.

“We are so thankful for the support we received from the college community with little Ozzy’s recovery journey. The kindness and care of our staff and students have been invaluable and humbling.”

Ozzy continues to go from strength to strength. Staff have discharged him from the Rescue Centre, and he is roaming free around the EcoSanctuary. His natural behaviours are flourishing too, and he can be seen foraging in the EcoSanctuary and joining other potoroos in the evenings. News of Ozzy’s remarkable story of resilience has spread beyond the college community. This week, Ozzy, our EcoSanctuary team and some of the students who made pouches for him have been featured on *7News Adelaide's Ray of Sunshine* and in *The Victor Harbor Times*. *ABC Adelaide* also stopped by to meet him and a feature about Ozzy is set to go to air in the coming days.

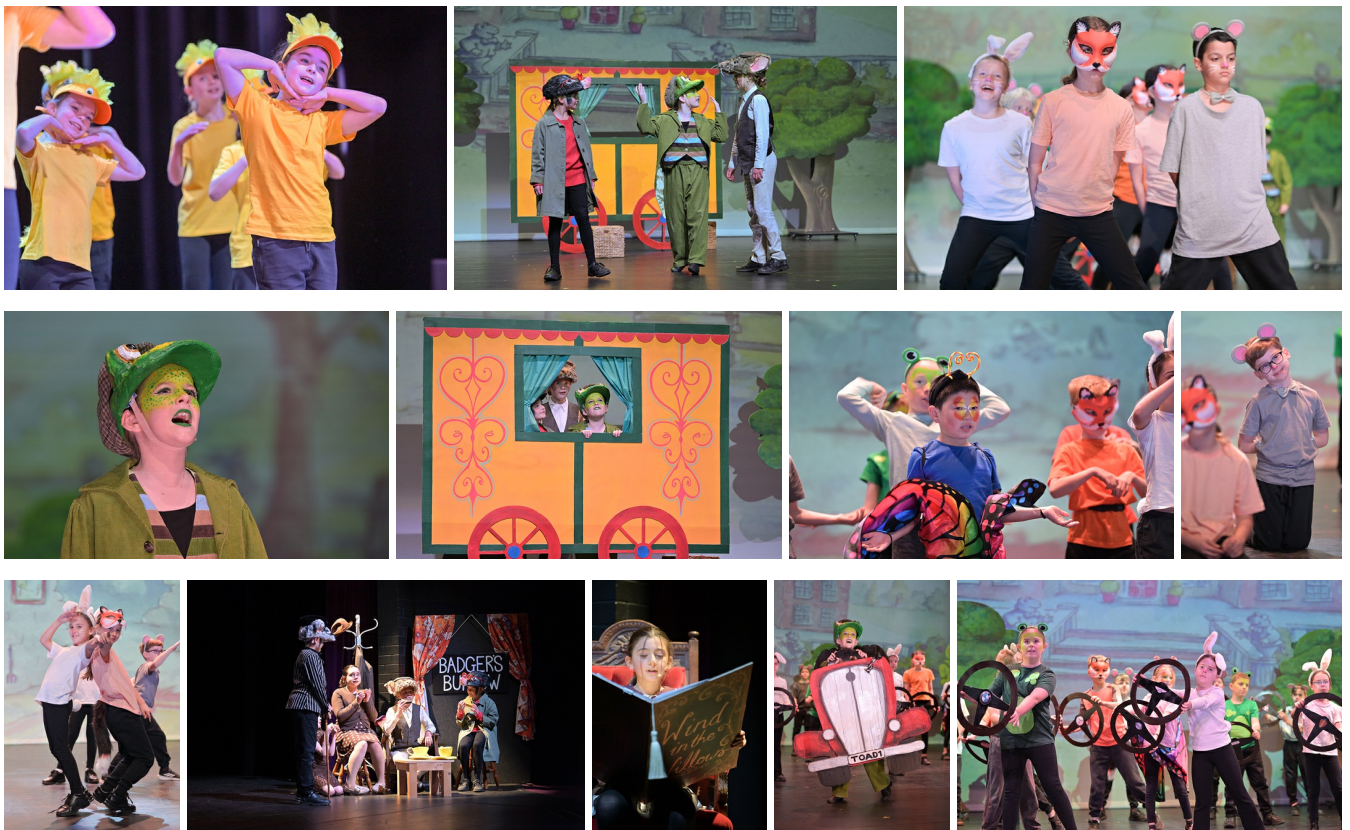

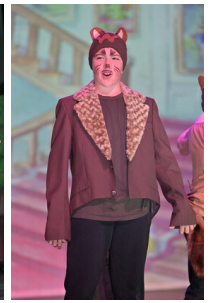
Congratulations to every student who took to the stage, worked behind the scenes or sang in the college choir. Our heartfelt thanks to the staff and families whose support made the production possible.

Learning about hope, faith and service to others





In the winter holidays, 21 of our Year 11 students and five teachers set off on the college's first-ever service-learning trip to Malaysia, as we build on our many successful service-learning trips to Cambodia. Our college has a long-term commitment to service learning because it's a crucial way for our students to serve communities while achieving personal and academic growth.

Tatachilla Lutheran College works with the Lutheran Church in Sabah, on the Island of Borneo, where we support their community and many other non-government organisations that work directly alongside Malaysian nationals to help local communities overcome many of the challenges they face, such as social exclusion and economic disadvantage.

During the 14-day experience, our college group travelled the length and breadth of Malaysia from Kota Kinabalu, the capital of Malaysia's Sabah state, to Kuching, the most populous city in Sabah, to Teluk Intan and the country's capital Kuala Lumpur on Peninsular Malaysia. Throughout the experience, our Year 11s learned about Malaysia's history by visiting historical sites and places of cultural significance. Staff and students also taught English and provided craft activities for children in a local school and worked with adults and children with disabilities in the community, where fundraising by Tatachilla has contributed to building modest homes, a school, and providing educational resources.

Highlights of the service-learning journey included Bethany Homes, where students worked alongside staff at a daycare centre for people with intellectual disabilities, and visual and hearing-impairments; The Dream Centre, a not-for-profit outreach service; and DumoWongi a social enterprise in Sabah specialising in the natural farming of herbs and edible flowers.



Our service-learning is designed to enable students to learn more about themselves and the world they live in, while meeting genuine community needs and key curriculum requirements. Importantly, service-learning teaches empathy and advocacy at the local, national and global level and is a part of educating the whole child as a responsible, global citizen.

The trip has had a lasting impact on our students with many reflecting on their experiences:

"In Kota Kinabalu, we visited the Kundasang War Memorial. Visiting the memorial helped us better understand the sacrifices these soldiers made and why it is so important to remember and honour their courage. We also visited the Semenggoh Orangutan Wildlife Centre near Kuching, where we were lucky enough to see orangutans in their natural rainforest environment. It was a memorable experience and highlighted the importance of protecting these endangered animals."
